We will be buying some florist roses and hopefully we can use them for demonstrations.

The outline will be:

First Program – Ralph Stream, cutting blooms, conditioning, storage and transporting.

Second Program – Satish Prabhu will show us how he selects and prepares hybrid teas for his winning National awards.

Third Program – Bob and Sandy Lundberg have a knack for making District and National award winners with their minis and minifloras. They will teach us how it's done.

Fourth Program – Glenn Schulman is a constant Queen winner. He will walk us through the process of grooming, how and when this starts.

Fifth Program – Jean Stream will show us how to make the left-over roses winners by using English Boxes, picture frames and palettes.

This is the first Exhibitors workshop in quite a number of years. Our hope is to generate new blood to show roses in our District. Facts have proven that once a society stops having rose shows, the club falls apart and just becomes a social club.

In years to come perhaps we can move this event around to better suit other workshops and programs. Hopefully this will be a lot of fun and very informative. It is always fun to hear how others get their flowers to stand up and be noticed by the judges. I hope to see a lot of you there.

Marion County Rose Society received a recognition award for outstanding membership growth. For those of you who could not make it to the convention this year, I hope that you will attend the Mid-Winter Meeting on January13-15, 2012 at the Best Western Conference Hotel in Gainesville, Florida. Our conventions and conferences are vital to keep our organization healthy and our members communicating with each other. As of this writing we still do not have a society to host the 2012 fall convention or the 2013 Mid-Winter Meeting. Please let us not make this the last year that we hold these meetings. Hosting district meetings is a great opportunity for your local society to be recognized as a leader in the district and to make money for your own treasury from hosting the event. It can make your society stronger, more cohesive and instill a sense of satisfaction for a job well done.

The weekend offers an exhibitors' workshop on Friday afternoon, great line-up of guest speakers on Saturday and a Sunday morning Consulting Rosarian school. The new structure for the Atlanta Garden at the American Rose Center in Shreveport, Louisiana is now complete. Our Atlanta rosarians are working on a list of the plantings for the garden and arbor over the central walkway from the parking lot to the Chapel. Thank you for your perseverance in seeing that this beautiful garden was reconstructed as promised by ARS when the old garden had to be removed to make way for the reflection pond.

Last count, ARS members were at 9,391 and the Deep South ARS membership has fallen well below our 1,000 member mark of recent years. Each of us needs to invite at least one new person to join ARS. There is room for all of us in this wonderful organization. Judges Review Jim Small, Chairman Horticulture Judges

It seems like I just wrote one of these articles for the DSD Bulletin. Normally I have a number of issues to address, but after a long hot summer that involved little to do with roses other than maintenance of my own garden, I am searching for topics to discuss. I just judged my first rose show of the fall season (in Ocala). Although the show was small (aren't they all now of days), there were many excellent blooms. It was certainly challenging to pick the best from the many excellent exhibits. I congratulate the show committee and the exhibitors. It is really nice to see some real competition. Still, I remember the good old days, over a decade ago, when several societies had not one or two, but an active cadre of excellent exhibitors who produced an amazing number of entries. We may never see that again.

In Ocala I had the opportunity to discuss with the District Director the need for a judging school this year. We have been able to identify several potential candidates for apprentice judge so we will need a school rather than a seminar. Most of our DSD judges completed their 4-year audits at the last school so fewer will need to attend the upcoming one. In the first judging school I ran, I was amazed to find how difficult it was to choose a date. Societies had their own schedules of events and it seemed like every weekend was booked. I ended up supplying most of the roses for the exam. As a Central Florida rosarian, the closer one gets to June, the fewer roses I can supply and the worse their condition. The exam is now more specific. For example, we need 5 hybrid teas of the same variety, plus four, three, and two of different varieties. We barely made it last time. My best roses are produced in April but that month conflicts with too many district shows. For my part, I like earlier rather than later. So, to generate controversy let me propose a date that is not set in stone and is not my favorite. I am merely putting it out for comment at the moment. So all of you should comment on it before the concrete sets. I will appreciate both nays and ayes. We are also looking at having the school in Gainesville at the same site as the mid-winter meeting, if possible. That is not set in stone either. We are merely putting a proposal on the table. So fire away!

For this school, I plan to streamline the curriculum a bit as a lot of the judge's manual is redundant. We do have to focus on the factual material apprentice judges will need to know for the written exam and the hands-on elements of judging for the practical exam. The latter will be covered in the afternoon workshop sessions that are optional for currently accredited judges. Under the format I am currently envisioning, I think we will need fewer instructors than usual.

As always, I need to remind our rose show committees to send me drafts of their rose show schedules for approval. If I approved your schedule last year and there are no substantive changes, you do not need to send it to me for re-approval.

I am looking forward to a good rose show season and excellent fall flowers. If I miss you at the District Convention and Show, I hope to see most of you at the mid-winter meeting.


2011 Horizon Roses

The 2011 edition of Horizon Roses is now available for purchase. Horizon Roses, published annually for nearly 40 years, is a compilation of comments by the nation's top exhibitors on the exhibition potential of the newest hybrid teas, floribundas, miniflora and miniature roses. It has long been considered an indispensible guide to buying new show roses [but can also be extremely helpful for the non-exhibitor who wants great garden roses]. This year's edition contains 100 pages of information with 2,138 reports on 313 roses by 85 reporters. The reports include 67 new roses not mentioned in prior issues. All comments are candid and reported in the words of the some abbreviation reporter (with and condensation). The reports are set forth alphabetically and include statistics of the show results of the reported varieties. In addition, information is provided on known sources for the reviewed varieties.

Horizon Roses is produced entirely by volunteers under the direction of Bob Martin, National Editor, and nine regional editors. The regional editors solicit and compile the comments from exhibitors in their region and forward them for final compilation. [Cindy Dale is the regional editor for DSD and is always looking for more reviewers. If you are interested in contributing, please e-mail her at rosepro@bellsouth.net].

By the time you read this, the 2011 rose season will be over and we will all be making plans for the upcoming year. I hope all of you had fun in your forays into rose arranging this year and are making plans to try even more new and creative things in 2012.

Congratulations to the DSD Challenge Class Winners at the Fall District Rose Show in Tampa, November 12. Jeff Hoffman won the Deep South District Challenge Trophy for the third year in a row and Marilyn Bertch won the District Director Miniflora Arrangement Trophy.

We are disappointed that we were unable to schedule an Arrangement workshop at the convention. Also, we will be unable to have one at the Mid-Winter Meeting in January. It is my hope that we can convince the hosts of the 2012 District Convention of the importance of arrangement workshops and have them allocate time and space for one in their schedule.


At this point, I question the value of having an arrangement judging school in the DSD in 2012. We presently have no candidates who have expressed interest in taking the judges exam and with no workshops, there is little opportunity to recruit any. Also, there are only two judges in the district that need to audit for credit this year and one of them would be unlikely to come down to Florida to satisfy this requirement. I think it would be difficult to assemble teachers to conduct the school with the prospect of such a low turnout. If there is no Judges School, we will structure the next workshop so that it can be applied as credit toward satisfying the audit requirement.

Several national arrangement judges and our National Arrangers Chairman are working on an

exciting project for 2012! The first ever Multi Regional ARS All Arrangement Show and Judges School will be held on June 1 & 2, 2011 at the Franklin Marriott Cool Springs, Franklin TN. Plans are just preliminary right now, but a reception and presentation are planned for Friday evening June 1, with the Show and Judges Seminars scheduled on Saturday and the exam for candidates on Sunday.

Attention arrangement judges! Your Annual Judge's Reports for 2011 are due by February 1. By the time you read this, you will have received the form by email as a PDF. If you have the current version of Adobe Acrobat Reader you may fill out the form in the PDF and return it to me by email. You may also print it, then fill it out and return it by regular mail if you are not comfortable using the electronic format. For those of you who still don't have email, I will mail it to you.



Consulting Rosarian Report

I personally don't see a problem with having both the judged and non-judged as long as they can coexist. There are folks who think judged shows are a thing of the past and this is where the CR's should be very adamant to the show support. As the only members of the Board of Directors in most clubs who don't rotate off, you have more pull than you may realize. Let's work to keep the Judged Shows.

I hope all CR's got their R.I.R. report sent in time. I will be receiving a report indicating who did or did not complete this requirement. Failure to report two years in a row will remove you from the ARS CR listings. The only way to be reinstated is to take the CR exam again.

The 2012 CR school is coming up in January at the Mid-Winter Meeting. I will be contacting as many of you as possible who need to audit in 2012. This year's school will be on Sunday morning 8:00 am to 12:00 noon, at the Best Western Hotel in Gainesville, FL. I should have received new candidate applications by now, but if you are a bit late, I will try to get you set up for the exam. This is the only CR school we have planned for the year. Please take advantage of it. The 2011 Annual CR Report is due to me by February 1st, 2012. This too is a required report of the Deep South District to stay active.

On pages 25 and 26 of this newsletter you will find the new CR report. Please use it for reporting. Our National CR chairman wants all reports to be consistent, so please don't use an earlier version. This form helps me track your credits as well. The form is also available on the DSD website as a PDF on the Consulting Rosarians page.

As we enter 2012 we have added 9 new CRs from two CR schools in 2011. Thanks to the Bradenton Sarasota Rose Society for hosting the summer school. There were 4 new CR who passed the exam with flying colors.



The queens went to 'Gold Medal', shown by Bill & Jill Chappell of Huntsville, AL; 'Bee's Knees', shown by Bob & Sandy Lundberg of Bluffton, SC; 'Conundrum', shown by Cindy Dale of Peachtree City, GA; 'Souvenir de la Malmaison', shown by Al Whitcomb of Brooksville, FL; and 'Kronprinzessin Viktoria von Preussen', shown by Connie Vierbicky of Sarasota, FL.

I heard that arrangers were sparse, but one person entered ten arrangements to make up for the shortage. The big winners were Jeff Hoffman of Sea Island, GA, who won the Deep South District Challenge, "A Salute to the Stars and Stripes". Marilyn Bertch of Lutz, FL, won the District Director's Miniflora Challenge, "Veterans Day". Jim Harrell won both gold medal certificates, for "Dawn's Early Light" and "Home of the Brave".

Karen Prevatt mentioned that only a handful of DSD societies had contributed to the \$100 Grand Campaign for ARS, and encouraged all to help out. Only 21 of our 30 local societies paid their dues to the Deep South District this year. And our planning for future years is constrained by an acute shortage of volunteers for future mid-winter meetings and fall conventions.

The Bradenton-Sarasota Rose Society is hosting the 2012 Mid-Winter Meeting (ya'll come!), but none are scheduled after that. It's not *that* hard to do, and it's a way to bring your society together and raise some funds – think about how you can participate in

district activities. If volunteers do not come forward, we will need to amend the DSD By-Laws to allow business meetings to be held at mid-winters.

In other business, Bill Langford of West Palm Beach, FL, was elected to serve as DSD Member of the National Nominating Committee. Ed Easom reported that the District spent only \$20.78 more than we received as income in FY2011, while adding another certificate of deposit. Then raffle drawings commenced, and as usual I won nothing. Those baskets sure looked nice, though.

California Dreaming

A couple of times a year Don and I succumb to the urge to visit a national convention. This year our travels conflicted with earlier ARS schedules, so we *had* to make it to one, the October convention in Hollywood, CA. As luck would have it, the Rose Hills International Rose Trial was the weekend before, so we were able to maximize the rosiness of our trip.

DSD attendees included Al & Sara Coleman, Don Schwarz, Ed Griffith, Kitsy Mostellar and Sandy Dixon.

After a long trip, we found ourselves at the Universal Hilton, with beds of roses lining the drive just uphill from beds of birds of paradise. Ed Griffith and Kitsy Mostellar were also in attendance for Rose Hills. The judging was an inspiring visit with the roses on a beautiful fall day, with '*Carefree Spirit*' chosen as the Golden Rose of Rose Hills. Ed Griffith, as WFRS Chair of Judging, recognized several new international judges, including Linda & Walt Reed. A few days later we returned to the Hilton for the ARS National Convention. We had heard rumors of last-minute management changes, and they did affect the way the convention ran, and the attendance.

First up at the convention was the rose show, on a Thursday afternoon! Kitsy, Ed, Sandy and I had the opportunity to judge, something we always enjoy. It was a small show, not a lot of entries, but with some very nice roses, compliments of Satish and Vijaya Prabhu, who swept the show, winning eight national and international challenge classes, including the J. Horace McFarland National Trophy and the Earl of Warwick Urn. What a feat! [Satish will be one of the featured speakers at the DSD Mid-Winter Meeting, you don't want to miss that!] Other notable wins included an entry of 'White Licorice', which won the Garden Web Rose Forum Best In Show (for single stem entries). It was outshone, however, by a fabulous international-style bowl of floribunda roses from Dick & Sue Streeper of San Diego, which won the best overall horticulture entry in the show. What a treat! Most other exhibitors and winners were from the southern California area, as you would expect.

The arrangements classes were mostly staged without backdrops and not against a wall, which made them harder to appreciate. Cynthia Chuang was the big winner here, including the Overesch and Millie Walters national trophies, plus the gold medal for standard arrangements, and the Best In Show award for arrangements. That's one designing woman! There was also a photography section, requiring 8x10" matted prints. Unfortunately, we never got to look at it after reviewing the horticulture and arrangements sections.

The most surprising thing about the show was that there was no head table. Winning entries were left in the general classes, sitting on a piece of gold paper. We found it hard to identify the winners with that kind of layout, and I realized afterwards that I never even saw the hybrid tea court. It was confusing for judging, as well. Also, there seemed to be only a limited number of keeper awards for winning entries. Quite a different feel for a show than we are used to.

Friday there were speakers and meetings, and we were racing around trying to get to them all. One was by Don Bifano, "landscaper to the stars", with photos and insights into the gardens of Barbra Streisand, Oprah Winfrey, and others. Yes, it's true, there are a hundred '*Barbra Streisand*' rose bushes in Barbra Streisand's garden. Another speaker was Sheenagh Harris of South Africa, president of the World Federation of Rose Societies, discussing "royal roses" named for British royalty. Stephen Scanniello of the Heritage Rose Foundation talked about the history of roses in New York City, and the Heritage Rose District being established there.

Then there were the working meetings. The convention planners got together to advise upcoming gatherings. After this convention in LA, the next national will be in the San Francisco Bay area in September 2012 (no spring show that year). On Mother's Day 2014 the convention will return west to San Diego, CA. The 2013 show is not yet committed, but may be in Houston. The Mini national for 2012 will be in Columbus, OH, in late July. Aren't you glad you went to the conventions when they were nearby? A group of newsletter editors got together to discuss sharing their resources.

Then there was the ever-popular ARS members' meeting, for an update on the business of ARS. We were reassured that despite some rough times, *"the ARS is still in business."* Expenses have been reduced by \$200,000 in the last four years, and the

This year's Miniature Rose Show and Convention was the 13th Annual Mini convention and also a celebration of the 100th Anniversary of the Syracuse Rose Society. The event planning was started in 2008 and the results showed the amount of effort that made this show such a great success. Co-Chairs Patricia Pohl and Dave Stever seemed to be everywhere as the event progressed.

The programs started with an Arrangements Seminar chaired by nationally renowned presenters Gary Barlow and Lew Shupe. They provided a seven hour hands-on workshop on fundamentals of oriental arrangements to kick off the Friday portion of the conference. Both instructors are specialists in the Ikenobo School and are Professors of Ikenobo-Ikebana.

Friday evening a Welcome Reception featured salad and several types of pasta prepared by the chef for you as you went through the buffet line. This evening activity gave us all a chance to meet and greet friends from all over the country that we hadn't seen in some time. This year's conference hosted approximately 130 participants.

The Syracuse area proved to be the perfect setting for the All Miniature Convention. There is something about a smaller town where the people enjoy sharing and the service people really want your business and want to show you their appreciation.

Then there was the team from the Syracuse Rose Society. Most members were on hand and there was contribution everywhere. The planning really showed and everything seemed to happen on time and without a flaw. Everyone seemed to have a job and executed it flawlessly. This convention is always enjoyable and of course very focused. The society really enjoyed sharing their 100th Birthday with the convention attendees.

In rose shows and conventions there are often newer members who are not yet comfortable with exhibiting and often stand back and wonder how they can contribute. There was one Syracuse member who was assigned as "jack of all trades". She has only been a member of this great 100 year society for 3 years but found many ways to contribute– such as tpublicity, program ads, program printing, collecting door prizes from the community, help out anywhere the Syracuse Team needed it, then there was helping out in registration, rose show setup & rose show takedown. While this person was typical of so many who helped, she was also exemplary in her contribution and the love of the rose she expressed. This person was Pam Dooling. I thought her job was "Chief Hostess" as she escorted winners to the awards stands, the camera line and cut the 100th Anniversary cake. **Thanks Pam for showing other newer members in any society how to get involved and making every winner feel special!** There is so much to do in such a short period of time, we all need to pitch in any way we can!

Greenhart Farms / Nor'East presented every participant with a 'Magic Show' rose.

As the rose show judging began, Mary Peterson presented the first talk of the day. "The Genesis of Miniature Roses and the Geniuses Behind Them". Mary has been an ARS member since 1974 and is currently both a Master Rosarian and the National Consulting Rosarian Chair. She resides in the New York District. Mary has researched this program over the past two years.

The second speaker was Dr. Jim Hering the ARS President Emeritus since 2005. Jim spoke on "the Award of Excellence: Its History, Winners, and What's in the Pipeline. Jim is a Master Rosarian and hales from the Buckeye District. He is the current Chair of the Miniature and Miniflora Rose Committee which is responsible for the Award of Excellence Program. Jim explained the process for the AOE program, how to enter a rose, the judging process and the elements of evaluation, the number of roses tested for two years at each test garden (3 roses) and a look at the test gardens spread across the U.S.A. Major emphasis on the program is to encourage more hybridizers to test their roses and to find ways to simplify the testing rules and process.

The third team of speakers was Richard J. Anthony and Kristine Vance also from the Buckeye District. Their topic was "Bankers and New Exhibition Miniature and Miniflora Roses". Richard has exhibited roses for the past 9 years and for the last 4 years has partnered with Kristine . They are both accountants and best friends. They grow approximately 970 roses with 350 large roses and varieties. They are avid exhibitors and speakers. They won 4 awards this year. They received the Miniature Queen for 'Joy".

Pat Shanley, District Director of the New York District spoke on "Where Do Roses Grow in New York City?" It was an interesting travel log of settings used in tight spaces and rooftops all over New York. Pat also covered the new book she has edited – "The Sustainable Rose Garden" A reader in rose culture. last four years, and the board and staff are working on additional fundraising and building membership. The one-time \$100,000 Campaign is about half-way to its goal. There will be a refreshed design for the **American Rose** magazine beginning in January, and the board will meet in Tyler, TX, in April in lieu of a meeting at a national convention.

Saturday brought us garden tours. We went to the Wrigley mansion in Pasadena, the headquarters of the Tournament of Roses. We toured their museum and rose garden, which is maintained by Pacific Rose Society members and features AARS roses. We also visited the Huntington Botanical Gardens, where Clair Martin, recently retired curator of roses, led the tour group visiting the roses. I love roses, but that was too many to see in less than a whole day! These rose gardens were lovely, but I do miss the opportunity to see private gardens when we're at conventions like this.

There was an Awards banquet on Saturday evening, when rose show and other awards were presented. Among the awards announced were two special rose awards, awarded periodically as merited. The James Alexander Gamble Fragrance Medal is awarded to a new, outstanding very fragrant rose. Roses are rated in public and private gardens for five years, and must carry a rating higher than 7.5. This year 'Elle', hybridized by Meilland International, was recognized as such a rose. The other award is the David Fuerstenberg Award, which goes to a new rose hybridized in the United States which is suitable to the American climate. This year, the award goes to 'Julia Child', hybridized by Tom Carruth.

One local note - during the evening Jeff Wyckoff presented an ARS Presidential Award of Merit to "Bobbie Reed, Don Schwarz, and the Rose Societies of North Georgia" for hosting the Fall 2010 ARS Convention. As we spoke to people at the newbies convention, from to experienced attendees, they all spoke positively about our GRITS convention. All were impressed by our Southern hospitality, and many remembered the cannon in the hotel lobby with Alice's flowers exploding out of it. One complaint was that the Civil War tour didn't have a sufficiently Southern bias, but you just can't please all the folks from North Carolina all the time. But truly, folks, we done good!


