District Director's Report

What a nice spring we have had here

in north central Florida. Temperatures have been very moderate for this time of year with near zero humidity. We thought our roses would be late coming this year due to the cool weather and lack of sunshine, but the roses did come in just a few days before our local Gainesville rose show. The thrips were very bad a couple weeks before our local show, but by rotating four different pesticides (I will share what I used if you

e-mail me and ask) to mist only the buds every three days, the thrips were wiped out just in time, and we had some very clean blooms. The past two shows we were able to attend were Gainesville and Thomasville; the bloom quality of both was outstanding. We saw lots of interest among the visitors who attended these shows. Very good news indeed!

Summer is on its way, and we all are invited to attend the Mini National Convention and Rose Show being held in Grantville, PA. This is near Harrisburg, PA, and is in the heart of Amish/Dutch country. The famous Hershey Gardens are nearby and part of Sunday's tour; it will not disappoint its visitors. Longwood Gardens are also within a couple of hours' drive; if you are staying a while, rent

Summer, of course, can be very stressful on our roses if they don't get enough of what makes them happy. Water, food, and protection are the essentials. I know a lot of you don't like to spray, but with some varieties chemical spraying is the only way to keep good clean foliage. For me, spraying gives me the opportunity to look over my roses every seven to ten days as I spray the garden. I know at a glance how they are doing and if there are any problems that should be addressed. Roses are a lot like people; they need their immune system to stay healthy. If they are constantly losing their leaves, the plants suffer, and you get few if any good flowers. Eventually the entire plant will just up and die. Good summer horticultural practices are essential any time

a car or drive your own vehicle. Longwood Gardens is located at Kennett

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of the year, but more so when it gets hot.

At our last MidWinter meeting the District's Executive Committee presented proposals to update our Guidelines for Conventions and Rose Shows and a few changes and additions in the District's Bylaws. These proposals could not be voted on due to the 45-day pre-convention notice requirement. The Board of Directors decided to offer an E-vote process for all District Presidents, giving them the 45 days to respond on the issues with a yes or no vote. I am very happy to report that all but one society voted yes for these much-needed updates and improvements. It's so rewarding to know we have this many team players; sadly not all can see the benefits. The next step is to have the ARS vote to approve our adjusted Bylaws at the National Mini Convention later this summer. Our District Guidelines for Conventions are a done deal; they need no ARS approval since they are not part of the District's Bylaws. Once approved the new Bylaws will be posted on the DSD website; the Guidelines are already there. Any society hosting a District event should download the Guidelines and follow them; it can help make your event successful.

Our folks in Atlanta are busy at getting all the details and preparations done for our 2016 Fall Convention and Rose show. They are promising an exciting and pleasant Convention. Mark your calendars now, and make plans for this fun time, October 7th, 8th, and 9th. Our hosts all need your support to help make these District events informative and fun. Please say yes to any request your society may receive.

In closing I want to thank every society that has committed to hosting a District MidWinter Meeting or Fall Convention. *Chris Woods*, our site chair, would love to hear from you in regards to hosting an event. We still are in need of hosts for the MidWinter Meeting 2018, and Fall Conventions for 2017 and 2018. Our goal is to have three years of meetings lined up in advance every year; this way we only need to line up the third year each year that follows. I know there are societies out there that can take on these fun and profitable events. Two or three clubs could work together to make it happen. Our newly updated Convention Guidelines walk you through the process. I will be ready to help out with whatever is needed as well with any additional info or support.

How Feeding Roses Works

Most everyone thinks, when applying fertilizer to the soil, that they are feeding the rose plant. The fact is that fertilizer feeds the soil, not the rose. Granular fertilizer has to be broken down by the bacteria and microorganisms in the soil. This process makes the granular fertilizer soluble so the roots can absorb the nutrients carried by watering.

Requirements

Roses are very heavy feeders that require constant nutrients. Slow release fertilizers and organics tend to keep some low dose of food available in the soil if done three to four times during the growing season. These are to be used in addition to a regular regimen-feeding program.

Feeding Benefits

A good feeding program is essential for good growth, flower production, and disease and pest resistance. Nitrogen, Phosphorus, and Potassium (NPK) are the three most important elements in the feeding program. Roses also require secondary and minor nutrients in the fertilizer to maintain a balance of nutrients. The secondary and minor nutrients are only needed in very small amounts, some less than 0.05%. Secondary nutrients are Sulfur, Calcium, Magnesium, and Iron; the minors are Zinc, Manganese, Copper, Boron, and Molybdenum.

What and When to Feed Roses

When buying a granular fertilizer the NPK should range from a 12-8-10, to a 10-10-10 formula. These type fertilizers should be applied every six to eight weeks due to the nutrients being leached from our sandy Florida soils.

In the spring after pruning, around mid-February to the first week of March, wait until the new growth is approximately three inches long before applying the first application of granular fertilizer. Organics can go down 30 days or so before the scheduled pruning dates since they will not burn the roots.

Stop all feeding by the end of October. One does not want to encourage any late cane brakes after mid-October. The canes will not have time to harden off before an early freeze. The loss of late canes will only stress the plant as it tries to go into dormancy for the winter.

Soluble fertilizers can and should be applied from time to time. The nutrients in solubles are available immediately to the root system because the soil's bacteria do not have to do any work in breaking anything down. Peters 20-20-20 or Miracle Grow 22-18-20 are a couple of products that work well, and both products have the secondary and minor nutrients in just the correct percentages.

How to Feed


When applying fertilizer, the amount each plant receives will depend on two issues. First is the plant's size, and second is whether the plant is being grown in a pot or in the ground. When using granular fertilizer, make sure the ground has been watered the night before application and again after you are finished.

Container plants should always receive approximately half as much fertilizer as you would use on the ground applications. But do feed pots more frequently. The roots in a pot can get burned if too much Nitrogen is used; this will kill the plant. Granular fertilizers should be worked down through the mulch before watering them in. If this is not done, the material can cake and harden on top the mulch and take a much longer time to get down to the little soil workers that break down the fertilizer.

What Makes Feeding Work

All the fertilizer in the world will be useless if the pH is not in the correct range. This range is from 6.0 to 6.5, slightly acidic. With neutral being 7.0, the pH scale is from 0.0 to 14.0. If the pH is too low or too high some nutrients will not be available (locked out), or just a low quantity will reach the root system. This means that the roots can't take up the food the plant needs to produce the sugars and starches. The leaves produce food for plant tissues through photosynthesis from the sun. So keeping as many leaves as possible on the plant is essential for good rose plant health and growth. See the pH chart below, which shows how the 6.5 range is ideal for roses.



Beneficial Supplements

Other forms of fertilizer can be used as conditioners of the soil and feed at the same time. Organics will do wonders if applied three to four times during a growing season. Animal waste has been at the top of the list for centuries. Other possibilities include composted vegetation, processed meals (alfalfa meal, cotton seed meal, bone and blood meals), mushroom compost, and last but not least products of the sea that are rich in every growth hormone known to man.

Correcting Soil Problems

It is advisable to have at least one soil test a year. Chemical fertilizers can and do build up soil salts that also can affect the nutrient delivery to the roots. These salts can become toxic if left unchecked. Adding gypsum or lime will help break down the surface salts so they can be flushed away. The application rate for either or both is one-half to three-quarters cup per plant in the spring and again in the fall. This too will aid in helping the pH stay in the correct range that is ideal for optimal growth and health.

Feeding Amounts

Fertilizer feeding rates vary depending on the size of each and every plant, as outlined earlier. By following these recommended amounts and always remembering to water before and after applications, you will not overfeed or starve your roses.

Granular feeding (NPK): 12-8-10 or 10-10-10 at the rate of $\frac{1}{2}$ to $\frac{3}{4}$ cup every six to eight weeks per plant.

Soluble feeding (NPK): Peters 20-20-20 or Miracle Grow 22-18-20 applied at the rate of one tablespoon per gallon, and one to two gallons per plant.

Organic feeding: one-half to two cups per plant of the previously mentioned products.

Slow release feeding: one-half cup at a time for the time-release formula.

Wrap Up

In closing, it is wise to contact a Consulting Rosarian for any feeding problems you may have questions about. They will all agree that a good feeding program is the second most important regimen in producing beautiful and prize-winning roses. The number one most important element of course, is water, and plenty of it. Water is the carrier of everything you put on the ground. Local rose societies have the experts that are available at no charge for advice. Growing great roses gives one a sense of pride; after all, it is our National Floral Emblem.

Horticulture Judges Review

The spring rose shows are now over. In Florida, and I think throughout the District, we can now look forward to a very hot summer and rather small rose blooms. Indeed, many of the blooms in my garden are already, in mid-May, one-third to half of their normal size.

This fall, the District show and convention will be held in Atlanta starting October 7, 2016. We have decided on having a Horticultural Judges Seminar at the convention to satisfy the quadrennial audit needs of our accredited judges rather than a full

school. We had contemplated having a school to train some badly needed new judges, but we got a late start on the process by taking time to identify potential candidate judges. Then my upcoming marriage made it hard to find an appropriate date when I could supply the needed roses for a school. We did find several candidate judges, all from the Atlanta area. Because of these difficulties and the ready availability of a Horticultural Judges School in the Carolina District, we have decided on having a seminar at the DSD Convention. This four-hour seminar will be given on Friday, October 7, 2016,

from 1 to 5pm. We have a dozen judges in our district who need the audit to keep their credentials current. Those who need a full school (candidate apprentice judges) should register for the Carolina District School. Here is the information:




I hope everyone has a good summer. I look forward to seeing you at the upcoming convention in Atlanta and judging with you at the fall rose shows.

Consulting Rosarian Report

hope your roses have been beautiful this spring and that you shared them with the public in your local ARS shows and festivals. For those societies no longer having ARS-sanctioned shows, please share with the rest of us the ways you have found to share your beautiful roses. Festivals and public displays can be very effective ways of sharing roses and mining for new members. Has anyone changed venues or formats recently with good results?

We in Jacksonville changed venues because our Garden Club decided they could make more money renting the space for weddings. Our move to a private school cafe-torium has worked great. Two years ago we initiated MAJOR changes. We switched to cash prizes. We also added a visitor-vote Fragrance class and held raffles for sustainable rose varieties during the afternoon. We added un-judged displays. The first year we had four FULL display tables of exhibits, including several beautiful bouquets/arrangements that a local non-member brought in. He later donated them for cut-rose sales.

This year our changes paid off—we only had two full tables of unjudged display roses, but most of the members whose roses had been unjudged last year switched to the ARS competitions so that we had 50% more ARS-show entries. Bantu Bryant's switch earned him several blue ribbons and the Dowager Queen award.

"So what can I write about?" *Linda Bohne* of the Greater Gwinnett Rose Society recently asked me. As CRs, we're supposed to write articles. I e-mailed her a long response, planning to share it with all of you:

Some of our societies' CRs may never have written an article – even having twinges of guilt. Sadly, I spend far more time writing about roses than I do in my rose garden.

Our inspiration is in our own gardens! Or the nearest public garden, or the last rose consultation we shared. Or the last time we decided to shovel-prune or add a new rose variety to our garden. What? Where? When? Why? How? Share your rose decisions—gardeners are eager for your expertise.

As a former college teacher of writing, I know that many people don't like to write at all. Of course many people think they are great writers—although others might not share that perception. Others may believe that they can't write because they lack inspiration. As Ernest Hemingway wrote, writing involves far more "perspiration" than inspiration. As Deep South gardeners we know perspiration.

In most of our societies, the newsletter is our means of sharing written ideas. As CRs can you inspire/badger your members to sustain a rose-of-the-month feature in the newsletter? CRs spend many hours on their hobby. For YOU, how and why did rose-growing evolve from gardening to hobby to passion? Why grow roses at all? What specific choices have you

made among the multitude of cultural practices, classes, and varieties?

To spray or not to spray, that is a great question with complicated consequences. If you don't spray, describe the new techniques, compromises, and durable varieties that you have discovered to enable the direction you've chosen in our pest-friendly district. If you do spray, what observations do you make that fulfill the feedback-loop function in your Integrated-Pest-Management process? Are you sure that your pests are not developing resistance to your chemicals? *Henry Everett* has promised an article this year about proper disposal of pesticides.

I think we all agree that rose success is local, whether on the show table or in the garden. Gardening is still the number one outdoor activity in America. The most valuable piece of real estate in your life is your garden—YOU choose to spend your time, effort, and money there! Gardening may be dirt and sweat, but it's also entirely creative personal ART. CRs should be demonstrating, showing, explaining (and writing) about how roses can bring beauty and enjoyment to every gardener, regardless of their level of knowledge and investment. Healthy roses are feasts for the senses and soul!

From the growing number of photo contests, I see that the folks who grow great roses are also taking great pictures. A recent *American Rose* magazine has a great article on iPhone/iPad photography. What was it about that rose or its setting that inspired you to pull out your smart phone, or go in the house for the camera? My greatest weakness is not capturing my inspiring rose visuals to share with my words.

Perhaps a pest-of-the-month feature? I've shared my experience with chilli thrips, Florida flower thrips, and Diaprepes root weevils as well as look-alike friendly and poisonous snakes.

How are you dealing with deer, dogs, armadillos, squirrels, nematodes, beetles, etc.? Is there a particular weed solution that you're smug about? I solved dollar weed, but never found a solution for Florida betony. Or what garden buddies do you welcome in your space—toads, frogs, lizards, pollinators, earthworms, birds? How do you attract them? The best appreciation I received in my campaign travels around the district last spring was a beautiful birdhouse given to me anonymously by a member of the Pensacola Rose Society.

The point of writing is to share the known, concrete, and specific—to draw out the expertise that resides inside you from years of making every sort of rose choice (and mistake) on your way to local success and friendships.

ADMIN Notes: Many of you are eligible to become Master Rosarians—earned by 10-years consecutive service as a CR and ARS member. If you are interested in this senior distinction, make sure you send me the completed application before August 1st. The nomination process is described on our DSD web site at http://deepsouthdistrict.org/consulting-rosarians/.

It's never too late to submit your 2015 CR report. Please take a few minutes to send me your thoughts, especially I'd like to have the list of your five most disease-resistant roses.

One of the obligations we accept when we become CRs is to learn about and share our experiences with new varieties: "Roses in Review". Since "Proof of the Pudding" days, as with "Horizon Roses," one of our great gifts to each other is our shared garden experience. Please be sure to complete your evaluations before the September deadline. K & M Roses has

Roses in Review

In 1925 the American Rose Society started a rose review program called "Proof of the Pudding", whereby members and non-members rated the roses they grew to assist others in their quest for high quality roses at the local nursery or other sources. This highly successful program continues today as "Roses in Review."

Most of you have participated in the program before and know that we review and rate roses in our gardens that are in their second through fourth years in commerce and are available in U.S. nurseries. They are rated on a scale of 1-10 and comments can be added. Your July/August issue of American Rose magazine will contain the list of cultivars to be rated this year as well as instructions. Garden and exhibition ratings from across the U.S. are averaged and published each year in *The Handbook for Selecting* Roses, an invaluable resource. Obviously, a higher number of reviews will give a higher statistical accuracy and that is why it is so important for all our DSD members to participate. You do not have to be an ARS member to participate. Consulting and Master Rosarians are expected to participate.

There are two ways to do your reviews. You

can fill out the paper form from the magazine and send it to us, or the much preferred method is for you to do your ratings online at www.rose.org. If you have access to a computer, we are strongly urging you to do it this way. Why? Because these ratings go straight to the national database. If you send it to us, we have to manually enter your numbers and comments for you, cutting into our time in the garden. We will be glad to do it if you can't do it online but please help us out and do it digitally if at all possible! The deadline is September 26th, which is a ways down the road, but you can be observing the applicable roses now and throughout the growing season until the list and forms are available and the information is on the website. Let us know if you have any questions.

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



- The entrant must be in junior high (middle) or high school by the deadline. Those individuals who have graduated in 2016 are eligible. The name and address of the school and the year that you will graduate from high school MUST be included on the entry form.
- Contestants are permitted to enter a maximum of three (3) digital photographs per category in all categories.
- Duplicate photos may NOT be entered in different categories.
- Digital photographs must be .jpeg files and must be high resolution files no larger than 60MB with at least a 4 megapixel resolution. The high resolution is necessary to ensure that winning entries will print properly in the magazine. Low resolution digital files will not be considered for awards.
- All photographs entered must have been taken by the student.
- Photographs which have won awards in previous ARS Photo Contests are NOT eligible.
- Grooming the rose(s) is encouraged and artificial backgrounds may be used.
- Digital photographs shall be saved in the following format: category number with the letters a-c for multiple pictures in the same class, last name of the contestant and the name of the rose or garden if it is known. If not known, please label as "unknown". Example: 10c_Aumiller_Unknown. Only one entry would be 10a_Aumiller_Unknown.
- Any added text that is on the photo itself will be cause for disqualification. This includes date, time, etc.
- Digital photographs may be enhanced by the use of any graphic program, such as Photoshop, Elements or Photo Impact.
- The chair of the committee reserves the right to disqualify any entry that does not conform to the stated rules prior to the entries being judged.

• ENTRIES MUST BE RECEIVED BY JUNE 30, 2016.

line to the photographer whenever possible. The photographer retains the copyright of the photograph. The American Rose Society may use the photograph in any publication, but will not sell the photograph. Any inquiries about sale of the photograph will be referred to the photographer.

Categories:

- 1. One bloom of any rose. There should not be other roses or buds in the photograph.
- 2. One rose, fully open, stamens must show. There should not be other roses or buds in the photograph.
- 3. One spray, two or more blooms, any rose. There MUST be at least 2 rose blooms of the same variety. A spray is when a rosebush has multiple blooms coming from one single stem.
- 4. Color Abstract or Impressionism: The photograph should evoke a sense of originality; a new and different way of imagining the rose or roses with the mind's eye. This may include processes used the alter the original photograph such as texturing, dodging, burning, dithering, painting, shadowing, blurring, layering, cloning, filtering, merging, cropping, etc. This does not include abstract arrangements.
- 5. Black & White Abstract or Impressionism: The photograph should evoke a sense of originality; a new and different way of imagining the rose or roses with the mind's eye. This may include processes used to alter the original photograph such as texturing, dodging, burning, dithering, painting, shadowing, blurring, layering, cloning, filtering, merging, cropping, etc. This does not include abstract arrangements.
- 6. A photograph of any rose garden. Photographs should show the use of roses within the structure of a garden, which can be widely variable. Roses should dominate in the photograph, and some layout of the garden should be visible. The name of the garden MUST be listed in the title of the entry.
- 7. Macro Photography: Photographs should be EXTREME close-up photos of any part of the rose or rose plant. Color, Black & White, Sepia or combinations of these are permitted in this class.

Judging:

The judging panel will consist of ARS Accredited Rose Judges who are photographers. All categories will be judged on photographic excellence and originality only. The ruling of the judges is final.

Awards:

There will be four (4) "Certificate of Photographic Excellence" Awards in each class IF warranted. The judges reserve the right to not award a first place award if the entries do not merit such an award. The best in each class will then be judged against each other to determine the 1st, 2nd and 3rd place winners. There will be cash awards of \$100 for 1st, \$50 for 2nd, and \$30 for 3rd places. The names of all winners will be published in the *American Rose* magazine.
