Horticulture Judges Review

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In my last column, I mentioned that there is a new, one-year, electronic recertification system available. We have several judges in the district that have not met the four-year audit requirement and have therefore been placed on inactive status. The judges list on the DSD website (http://deepsouthdistrict.org) was revised recently and now lists only judges who are in good standing. I have recently done my first electronic recertification for a lapsed judge. I think it was a good

experience both for the judge and for me, the evaluator. The electronic recertification package consists of a number of questions about judging and the guidelines. I read the lapsed judge's answers and made suggestions as appropriate. There are also photos of roses for the judge to evaluate. I review their assessment and make suggestions. It took

me a little over a week to review and write up my evaluation of this judge's performance. That may be due to my being a novice on this process; I may be quicker in the future. I was quite impressed with the knowledge of the participating judge and made only a limited number of suggestions. This is not an examination but a forum for discussion of judging. It is somewhat patterned on what we do in a judging seminar. Once completed the judge is placed back on active status for a period of one year. The DSD will hold a school or seminar in 2018 that the newly recertified judge will need to attend to continue as an active judge. This is not an onerous task. I encourage lapsed judges to contact me, do the electronic recertification package, and gain the one-year certification. We need you back among active judges.

The Spring show season has arrived. I have attended shows in Gainesville, Thomasville, and Jacksonville over the last two weeks, either judging or exhibiting. Shows are smaller these days but there were still enough roses for a good public display and good quality roses for judges to evaluate. I know we all cross our fingers that enough roses will show up to make a show. We were lucky this time but unless we get more people to try their hand at exhibiting the future of rose shows in our district does not look all that bright to me.

Judges at the Thomasville show spent some time discussing a rose with growth in the leaf axil and whether it should be disqualified or just penalized. My opinion was that the rose should be disqualified. The guidelines state,

"Certain classes require the one-bloom-per-stem specimen to be without side buds. For judging purposes, a side bud is defined as growth emanating from a leaf axil, having sufficient maturity to display the *formation of a stem*, with or without a flower bud. This condition is subject to disqualification. An immature leaf with *no stem* is subject to penalization depending on the degree of distraction."

In the case under discussion, there was about a half-inch stem emanating from the axil. It had no leaves or a bud. My criterion was that it was a stem and therefore must be disqualified. If it were just immature leaves then one would only penalize it. However, if the leaves were mature then I would also disqualify it as we discussed in the last judging seminar. We also had a discussion about a bit of a stem in a leaf axil of a spray. This is not a single bloom specimen so the above rule does not apply. If that growth was distracting, and I believe it was, I would certainly penalize it but there is no basis for disqualification.

At the time of writing this column, I have one more show to judge. I look forward to working with my judging colleagues at that show. I hope all of you have a pleasant summer break while waiting for the upcoming fall show season.

Spring Rose Shows: Thank you to the CRs who have supported this spring's rose shows. I hope your roses were beautiful and that you shared them with the public in your local ARS shows and festivals. Did you also share pictures of them on Facebook, in "Rose Chat", or on your society's group page?

If you haven't seen and smelled the 2013 David Austin rose '*The Poet's Wife*,' check it out! *Ray Guillebeau*'s "Best Modern Shrub" at the Jacksonville Show was the finest combination of visual beauty and delightful fragrance that I have experienced in years.

I exhibited in two spring shows this year. The Gainesville RS Show on April 22 featured 212 horticultural entries and several

tables full of arrangements. In Jacksonville, the next weekend, fifteen different exhibitors entered 201 horticulture entries into competition and there were 39 gorgeous specimens on our non-judged display tables. There were 16 arrangements entered. For the first time in several years, *Sandy Dixon* did not have to put together a last-minute arrangement to fill the available classes and niches.

I offer special "thanks and praise" to *Jean Giesel* of Gainesville and *Sandy Dixon* and *Ray Guillebeau* of Jacksonville who chaired their society's rose shows.

If your society no longer has a formal ARS-sanctioned rose show, please share with the rest of us the innovative ways you have found to share your beautiful roses. Has anyone changed venues or formats recently with good

results?

Many of the successful rose societies around the country serve their communities and grow their membership by sharing beautiful roses and free rose expertise at special horticultural events and local nurseries, public garden celebrations, and agricultural fairs.

Chilli Thrips: I was recently lured into a discussion about chilli thrips on Facebook's "Rose Chat." Some Alabama rosarians have joined the chorus of sadness sung by we Floridians and rosarians in Southeast Texas. Dr. Allen Owings, Chairman of the ARS's Gulf District and a research horticulturalist at LSU tells me that some rosarians in Louisiana are now fighting chilli thrips. Usually, however, "Rose Chat" is filled with the happiness of beautiful pictures of

roses and gardens. Try it; the pictures and positive comments are delightful. You'll enjoy it and learn things.

Modern Shrubs are the new Floribundas. Every few years we witness an emerging trend in the rose world. In the late 19th Century, Hybrid Tea roses replaced the older Teas. In the mid-20th Century, Floribundas replaced Polyanthas. As the 21st Century began, '*Knock Out*' shifted the nature of roses sold in American nurseries. Easy-care, sustainable varieties from all the major rose producers are flooding the markets and filling our landscapes. The latest trend in rose classes was demonstrated in this spring's shows: roses classed as Shrubs are replacing Floribundas. The shows I have seen in the last few years have had fewer Floribunda entries than Modern Shrubs.

Roses that used to be registered by the rose breeders and companies as Floribundas are now more commonly registered with the ARS and marketed in America as Shrubs. Several of the Shrubs competing now in the American Garden Rose Selections trials have extensive championship résumés as Floribundas in Europe. The rose companies of America sell landscape plants; they know that gardeners take for granted that Shrub roses grow well in home landscapes. In contrast, the label Floribunda suggests a fussy plant that may require special care. Just as Polyanthas were replaced by Floribundas, Shrubs are replacing Floribundas.

The proliferation of Shrubs was illustrated at the Gainesville Rose Show on April 22. In four Floribunda classes, there were a total of 11 entries: six one-bloom-per-stem, one spray, one painter's palette, and three floaters. In the single class for Modern Shrubs, there were 13 varieties entered. In the "Rose on Water" class for Shrubs and OGRs, a big bowl of the yellow David Austin shrub 'Molineux' was spectacularly more beautiful than

the bowls of the OGRs 'Souvenir de la Malmaison' and 'Eugene de Beauharnais.'

A Rose may be a Rose, but what is a Hybrid Tea? At the Gainesville Show I saw another particularly interesting aspect of the changing times and tastes. Rose companies can register their new roses as belonging to whatever class they want. We now have marvelously disease-resistant Hybrid Teas from Kordes of Germany and Meilland of France. However, the gardeners of Continental Europe never boughtinto the American ideal that a high-pointed, spiral center should be the most important aspect of perfection in a Hybrid Tea rose. The "perfect" blooms of many of these Hybrid Teas from Europe do not conform to ARS Hybrid Tea standards. For the Europeans, classification as a Hybrid Tea is more about the genetic background and plant-growth habit than bloom form.

I don't use fungicides in my garden, but my Kordes HT, 'Beverly,' had perfect foliage and won a blue ribbon in the fully-open class at the Gainesville show. However, my

"exhibition-stage" 'Beverly' didn't even receive an honorable mention because of a flat, balled center that is common for the variety. Another "decorative" Hybrid Tea, 'Traviata,' introduced by Meilland in the late 1990s, presented a bigger quandary for the judges: the gorgeous bloom looked like a deeply-cupped Austin. The judges didn't know what to do with it because its perfect form was a hollow cup rather than a highpointed spiral. They simply set it aside. The ARS's "perfect-exhibition-stage" Hybrid Tea is increasingly anachronistic among the roses that American gardeners are buying.

Administrative Notes

Master Rosarians: Many of you are eligible to become Master Rosarians—earned with 10 years of consecutive, outstanding service as Consulting Rosarian, local-society leader, and ARS member. If you are interested in this distinctive recognition of your exceptional service as a CR, make sure you send me the completed application before August 1st. The nomination process is described and the application is available on our DSD web site at http://deepsouthdistrict.org/consulting-rosarians/. There is no committee or anyone else who will nominate you. The application is complex, and only you will have adequate knowledge of your service to fill it out.

Annual Consulting Rosarian Report for 2016: It's so disappointing that over half of our DSD CRs have ignored their obligation to submit the annual report of their 2016 service. It's never too late to submit your 2016 CR report. Please take a few minutes to send me your thoughts. I'd especially like to have the list of your five most disease-resistant roses. The report form is available on the DSD web site and I have asked our webmaster to change the date to 2016.

Those of us obsessed with Old Garden Roses know that the cut-off date to identify an OGR class is 1867, when the first Hybrid Tea was introduced. But had it occurred to you that this year is the sesquicentennial (150th anniversary) of the introduction of the Hybrid Tea? Here is a photo of that first Hybrid Tea, 'La France'. How far we've come!

Rose Research Update

Dear Rose Enthusiasts,

Here in Texas, we have experienced a warm December, January, and February, which was interrupted by hard freezes in December (22°F) and January (16°F). Otherwise we have enjoyed many days in the 60 to 80°F range. This weather has encouraged an early bloom on the lower chill peaches and is delaying the bloom on the higher chill peaches due to the lack of chilling temperatures needed for good growth in the spring. A similar reaction is seen among roses where our china types have been growing/flowering whereas others more northern types are hesitating a bit. Every year is a climatic adventure here in Texas!

In November the Combating Rose Rosette Disease Project Review met in McKinney, Texas. Many thanks go to the <u>Chambersville Heritage Rose Garden</u> (Dean Oswald and Claude Graves) for supplying the venue, to <u>Star Roses and Plants</u> for sponsoring the refreshment/meals, to Pam Smith for supplying transportation and giving us a tour of

the <u>Farmers Branch Rose Gardens</u>, and to <u>Natalie Anderson</u> who put it all together. Without their help, the meeting would not have happened! We had a wonderful group of scientists, graduate students, technicians and advisory board members attending (see <u>group picture on Facebook</u>). The progress reported in the project was impressive. It was a very invigorating meeting in which new ideas were discussed and the future work was envisioned. One of the exciting early results is the diagnostics being developed to detect the virus.

When we began the work on the Combating Rose Rosette Disease project, the causal virus was recently described as a new class of viruses called **Emaraviruses**. At that time, the diagnostic approach was to confirm the symptoms with a test that was expensive in terms of the equipment, labor, and time. Thus one of the objectives was to develop easy-to-use diagnostic tests. This task was worked on collaboratively by three groups of scientists (Francisco Ochoa at Oklahoma State, Mathews Paret and Binoy Babu at the University of Florida, and Ramon Jordan and John Hammond at the USDA). Over the past two years, this diagnostic group has looked at a range of molecular and immunological approaches and developed several that appear to be as accurate or more so than the previous diagnostic test and much easier and faster (as quick as 15 minutes!) to run on a routine basis. The researchers have passed these tests onto Jen Olson (<u>Plant Disease and Insect Diagnostic Lab</u>, OSU) and Kevin Ong (Director, <u>Texas Plant Disease Diagnostic Lab</u>) who are determining how reliable they are in a working diagnostic lab. Once validated, the next step is to make them commercially available. Congratulations to these fine scientists for their great work!

In January, I attended the <u>Plant and Animal Genome</u> meetings, the most

important meeting of scientists working on agricultural genomics in the world. There I presented the work we (graduate student Muqing Yan and Dr. Patricia Klein) have been doing to construct a genetic map of the diploid rose with molecular markers. This work is significant because it has greatly increased the number of DNA or genetic markers available and sets the stage to begin associating them with important traits such as disease resistance. This will accelerate the process of developing better disease-resistant rose cultivars. It was an exciting meeting with lots of new ideas. While there I was able to talk with Dr. Mohammed Bendahmane of Lyon, France, about the work they are doing in sequencing the rose genome (soon to be published!) as well as Dr. Rene Smulders and Dr. Paul Arens of the Wageningen Plant Research in The Netherlands about the genetic analysis of roses.

In Texas, our rose seedlings are now beginning to flower in the greenhouse. I have been posting pictures weekly to show the progress on our <u>Facebook page</u>. This group of seedlings includes many key families in our quest to understand the inheritance

of RRD resistance. As with last year, these will be propagated and then sent to our collaborating plant pathologists for RRD resistance evaluation. This year we are sending the first set of seedlings from families that should have some resistance to RRD. Many thanks go to our collaborating rose breeders including Weeks Roses (Christian Bedard), <u>David Zlesak</u>, Star Roses and Plants (Michele Schreiber), Ball Horticultural Company (<u>Scott Trees</u>), <u>Roses by Ping</u> (Ping Lim at Altman Plants), and <u>Roses by Design</u> (Jim Sproul).

We have been planting more roses for evaluation in Texas (College Station and Overton with Brent Pemberton), Oklahoma (Tulsa with Jen Olson), Tennessee (Crossville with Mark Windham), and Delaware (Newark with Tom Evans). The roses for this work have been supplied by Francis Roses, Seville Farms, Bailey Nurseries, Star Roses and Plants, Weeks Roses, the Antique Rose Emporium, and Chamblee's Rose Nursery.

We just returned from our annual <u>RosBREED project meetings</u> in Michigan. In this national project we work with Dr. Stan Hokanson (University of Minnesota) as well as a group of other breeders of Rosaceae crops to develop genetic tests for breeding purposes. In the rose our focus is on black spot resistance.

If you have any questions about our work here at Texas A&M University or how to support the Basye or Moore Rose Collection and Legacy, the Rose Breeding and Genetics program, and our students, please contact me (dbyrne@tamu.edu). We need your support for student scholarships and to maintain the many research gardens needed for an excellent research program. Your support makes our program possible. In this regard, I would like to thank Kawamoto Roses of Japan for their commitment to donate to the program on a yearly basis to support the ongoing work in rose genetics and breeding.

- 3. One fully open Hybrid Tea or Grandiflora one bloom per stem, no side buds



- permitted, stamens must be visible. Single-petalled HTs or GRs allowed.
- 4. **One Floribunda one bloom per stem**, no side buds permitted, <u>most perfect phase of beauty</u>.
- 5. **Floribunda or Polyantha Spray** must have two or more blooms.
- 6. **Old Garden Rose** one bloom per stem or spray, side buds permitted. Entries must be submitted with date of introduction. Two awards will be given: Dowager Queen for roses introduced before 1867, and Victorian Award for roses introduced in 1867 or later and those which have unknown date of introduction.
- 7. **Shrub Rose** Classic Shrubs (H. Kordesii, H. Moyesii, H. Rugosa, or H. Musk) or Modern Shrubs, one bloom per stem or spray, side buds permitted. No David Austin roses (see Class #8).

- 8. **David Austin Roses** one bloom per stem or spray, side buds permitted. Must be a David Austin introduction.

- 10. Species Roses one bloom per stem or spray, side buds allowed. See Modern Roses (www.stsrv.com/modernroses12), ARS Handbook for Selecting Roses, Official List of Approved Exhibition Names for Exhibitors and Judges, or visit www.helpmefindroses.com.
- 11. **One Miniature** one bloom per stem, no side buds permitted, <u>exhibition stage</u>, no single-flowered cultivars.
- 12. **One Miniflora** one bloom per stem, no side buds permitted, <u>exhibition stage</u>, no single-flowered cultivars.
- 13. **Miniature or Miniflora Spray** must have two or more blooms. Single-petalled cultivars allowed.
- 14. **One fully open Miniature or Miniflora** one bloom per stem, no side buds permitted, stamens must be visible. Single-petalled cultivars allowed.
- 15. **Any Arrangement** ANY class of rose. Must include arranger's name and the names of roses.
- 16. **Macro Photography** any part of a rose photographed at extreme close range, may include insects.
- 17. **Abstract or Impressionist Photography** a photo having non-objective design, form, or content of a rose(s) or any part of a rose. May be digitally manipulated.
- 18. **The Rose Garden** a photo taken of a garden prominently featuring roses.
- 19. **Novice/Youth Class** any rose from an entrant who has not won an award (1st, 2nd, 3rd, or Honorable Mention) from a DSD or ARS Photo Contest.



Heritage Rose Foundation Conference 2017

On May 17th through the 21st, I attended the 2017 Heritage Rose Foundation Conference in Fredericksburg, Virginia. The Heritage Rose Foundation is a nonprofit organization established in 1986, devoted to the preservation of old roses. The group helps to maintain several gardens and cemeteries with historic roses and they also collect and preserve rare rose varieties.

Connie Hilker was the organizer of the event, and the banquet was at her home in Virginia. Connie and her husband Steve have restored a 19th century home, Hartwood Manor, and planted many historic roses. I first met Connie on GardenWeb, the online discussion board for gardening, which has pages devoted to roses and one for Antique Roses. Connie and I met in person at a Garden Show in Charlotte, NC. A bunch of people who participate on GardenWeb were there. Connie and I have stayed in touch through GardenWeb

and Facebook and I have watched her home and garden evolve over the years. So, when I heard that the event was around and at her home, I decided to attend.

The first part of the weekend was the tour of Monticello, Thomas Jefferson's home. We boarded the buses at the hotel and were on our way. The first area we explored was Tufton Farms, where a collection of Antique roses, many of the same historic roses that were at Monticello, were kept. The Léonie Bell Rose Garden was part of the Center of Historic Plants (CHP) at Monticello. The Rose Garden was a collection of Noisettes.

The Bell Garden was designed to tell the story of rose breeding and development that began with this first American rose hybrid. In addition to the obvious varieties – the 'Champneys' Pink Cluster', 'Blush Noisette', and the parents 'Old Blush China' and "Double White Musk" – the garden includes many one-of-a-kind selections.

The garden, designed by Charlottesville landscape architect and historian C. Allan Brown, is reflective of 18th and 19th-century Rosary Gardens, which were planted generally in a circular design creating an intimate enclosure of roses either festooning as garlands or freely flowering as bushes. Tufton's garden is octagon-shaped, one of Thomas Jefferson's favorite forms, with paths bisecting the center and is surrounded by eight-foot posts connected with chains for the climbing sorts.

In addition to Louis Bell's contribution toward the garden's construction, CHP has received support from members of the Heritage Roses Group, The Philadelphia Rose Society, and other individuals with a passion for rose preservation and enduring esteem for Léonie Bell.

In addition to the roses there, we were able to purchase roses and other plants propagated at the nursery. There was one rose that was covering an arbor and was the object of much attention. That rose, "Arcata Pink Globe", a Hybrid Setigera, was also available for sale, so I brought one home. I hope mine can achieve the look of the one at Tufton Farms.

Some of the roses there were familiar, 'Old Blush', the Apothecary Rose (Rosa gallica officinalis), the Swamp Rose (Rosa palustris), 'Champneys' Pink Cluster', 'Blush Noisette', etc. Some I had not heard of before. I began to understand that there was a whole different world of Historic Roses and I was there to learn about them. The roses were in full bloom and the fragrance wafting from the row of roses was intoxicating.

Then we were onto the 'Top of the Mountain' as the tour guides called it. Monticello (Italian for sweet little mountain) sits on top of a mountain overlooking the Virginia countryside. We had lunch at the visitor's center and then boarded a shuttle to the home. I can see why Jefferson wanted his home up there; the view was amazing. And of course, on the approach, you can see the home from a mile away.

The home was smaller than I thought it would be, but impressive. It took Jefferson over forty years to design and complete his home; most of the time he was away, serving as Governor of Virginia, Minister to France, in Washington, DC, as the first Secretary of State under George Washington, then as Vice President under Adams, and as President of the United States for two terms. In 1809, Jefferson retired from public life and began living full time at Monticello.

Jefferson was a farmer. He owned lots of land and the main crops were tobacco, corn, and wheat. He also had an experimental vegetable garden with food crops. Around the West Lawn of the home, there was a 'Winding Flower Border'. The gardens were tended

to by Jefferson's daughters and granddaughters. There were also several oval flower beds where most of the roses were planted. We had the pleasure of having a private tour by HRF member and former Monticello tour guide, Peggy Cornett. Some of the roses there were Apothecary Rose (*Rosa gallica officinalis*), Rosa Mundi (*Rosa gallica versicolor*) and Double Musk (*Rosa moschata plena*) rose.

The following day included events at Belmont, the home of artist Gari Melcher and his wife. Melcher was an artist in the late 19th and early 20th century. The home in Falmouth, Virginia, was originally built in the late 18th century and had passed through

several hands when Melcher and his wife bought it in 1916. The featured 'Long Walk' is a boxwood-lined walk which runs north to south along the house above a terrace. The main points of interest were the two arbors with 'Tausendschön' climbing on them. Our guide, Beate Ankjaer-Jensen, told us that the arbors originally also had 'Dr. W. Van Fleet' on them as well. There is also an ornate curved double stair with ironwork leading to the East Porch.

The original architecture was Georgian, which is based on symmetry and geometry, represented at Belmont in the four parterre beds on the south lawn; triangular beds edged in boxwood are filled with roses, annuals, and tulips. Corrine Melcher restored most of the gardens. Especially the roses.

The Conference at Belmont was the site of our lectures for the event. There were four speakers. Beate Ankjaer-Jensen spoke of the history of Belmont, especially the

roses. She is responsible for restoring the gardens to their former glory. To make the event a bit more fun, she sent us on a 'Rose Scavenger Hunt'. We were supplied with a list of the roses at Belmont and we were to check them off as we toured the grounds. Even I, a novice at historic roses, was able to identify 'Frau Karl Druschki', 'Paul Neyron', 'Lady Hillingdon', and 'Dainty Bess'. There was much discussion of roses in two of the beds, one was thought to be 'Eutin' (which is what it was purchased as) and another which was thought to be the Hybrid Perpetual 'Mrs. John Laing'. It was amazing to me to be among such rose experts as Mike Shoup, owner of Antique Rose Emporium, and Malcom

Manners, Professor at Florida Southern College and 'Great Rosarian the World 2013'. The amount of knowledge and experience in identifying roses was fascinating and educational.

The Lectures were fascinating. The first Lecture was "Reimagining the Rose at Harvard" by Benjamin Whitacre. The talk revolved around a rose at The Arnold Botanical Garden at Harvard. The rose featured was 'Arnold' a hybrid of Hybrid Perpetual 'Général Jacqueminot' and Rosa rugosa, by Jackson Thornton Dawson. There was history of Harvard and the Botanical Gardens there and the many people involved in the 300-plus years of history of the gardens and also the rose hybridizers of the late 19th and early 20th century.

The second speaker was Beate Ankjaer-Jensen, who spoke of the history of Belmont, the artist Gari Melcher and his wife Corrine and their life at Belmont. We were invited to tour the home and gardens at Belmont and of course identify the roses there.

The third speaker was Scott Dean who spoke about "Roses Before 1600" and told the history of roses up to the middle ages. There were fascinating facts about roses that are still used today in gardens and for perfume manufacturing. And of course, about rose petals used in Roman celebrations to such an extent that people were smothered by them. He discussed the history of the York and Lancaster roses and how some of these roses are still in commerce.

The last speaker was Mike Shoup, owner of Antique Rose Emporium, who told of his history with horticulture and how he developed his love of antique roses. His book, *Empress of the Garden*, was available to buy and have Mike sign it.

The next day began with a trip to Hollywood Cemetery in Richmond, Virginia. The cemetery was founded in 1847; the name Hollywood comes from the numerous holly trees in the area. In 1858, the Commonwealth of Virginia reinterred the remains of President James Monroe to Hollywood Cemetery and erected the monumental James Monroe Tomb. In 1862, President John Tyler was buried in President's Circle, in front of the gravesite of James Monroe. Hollywood became one of the largest cemeteries in Richmond for military interments during the Civil War. One particular area of the cemetery became known as the Confederate Section due to the immense number of Confederate soldiers that were buried there. The Hollywood Ladies Memorial Association was founded to care for the graves of Confederate soldiers. The association reinterred an estimated 3,000 bodies from the Gettysburg battlefield to Hollywood Cemetery. Confederate President Jefferson Davis was reinterred in Hollywood Cemetery in 1893.

The heritage roses in Hollywood Cemetery have been maintained over the years

by the Friends of Hollywood Cemetery under the guidance of HRF director Connie Hilker. The roses here are some originals, but most are replacements of roses that were planted at gravesites, the original roses having been lost over the years, some recently due to Rose Rosette Virus.

Some of the roses we saw were 'Old Blush', 'Madame Berkeley', 'William Baffin', 'Mrs. B.R. Cant', and the "Crenshaw Musk", which is a double musk rose (Rosa moschata plena) at the Crenshaw gravesite [see photo below right]. While we were at the cemetery, we planted four roses to replace those that were lost. The "Temple Musk", which was

at the Temple gravesite, but lost, was replaced. 'Duchesse de Brabant' was planted at a graveside near President's Circle to replace one that was there. 'Safrano', a Tea rose, was replaced nearby. The original 'Safrano' was still there a few years ago, but sadly succumbed to RRD. Connie Hilker had previously taken a cutting of 'Safrano' before it was diseased and had this cutting growing in her garden. Connie then took a cutting of that plant so she was able to have this cutting of the original plant of 'Safrano' planted in the spot where it's 'grandparent' came from.

The final evening of the event was a visit to
Connie's home, Hartwood Manor. Connie's gardens are immense and include a Rambler
Fence, a Van Fleet section, a David Austin section, and newly installed miniature and
vintage Hybrid Tea sections.

At the banquet, we were also able to purchase plants donated by Mike Shoup, Malcolm Manners and others. We then had an auction of more plants, books, and other rose-related items. The Auction was hosted by Steve Scaniello, who made it fun and raised a lot of money for HRF. HRF also donated grants to several organizations, The Friends of Hollywood Cemetery and Peggy Cornett and her work at Tufton Farms among them.

All in all, it was a very fun and interesting trip. I was able to meet people I have conversed with for years on Garden Web and Facebook, and also meet new people. We all shared a love of old roses and that was enough to make us friends. I also learned that there is a whole different world of old roses and I want to learn about it. The HRF is a great organization. Their event next year will be in New York City and will include a trip to the Peggy Rockefeller Rose Garden at the New York Botanical Gardens. I am planning to attend. For more information, see Heritage Rose Foundation.

Qualifications & Forms

Any member of the American Rose Society who also is an active member of an ARS Charter or affiliate local society may qualify as a Consulting Rosarian by the following:

- 1. Must be at least 18 years of age.
- 2. Must be a regular or associate member of the American Rose Society for **three consecutive years**.
- 3. Must be an active member of a local rose society.
- 4. Must have grown roses of various types for at least five years and should be **knowledgeable about** equipment and materials related to **rose culture**.
- 5. Must send a completed CR Candidate Form and three letters of recommendation to the candidate's District Consulting Rosarian Chairman at least thirty days before the CR School. The letters of recommendation must be on the CR Candidate Letter of Recommendation Form and must be signed by three active Consulting Rosarians.
- 6. Must attend an approved **ARS school/workshop for Consulting Rosarians** and complete and pass a **multiple-choice**, **open-book written exam** based on the material contained in the Consulting Rosarian Manual with a score not less than **75%**.
- 7. Must be in attendance at all programs presented at the school.
- 8. Must know and be willing to live up to the Consulting Rosarian Code.
- 9. Must be willing to attend no less than one Consulting Rosarian School every four years or accrue four credits in four years by attending approved Seminars, one of which is Chemical Safety/Pesticides.
- 10. Must exhibit a continuing willingness to share knowledge and an enthusiasm for the rose and the American Rose Society ideals.
- 11. Filing a "Roses-In-Review" report yearly is expected.
- 12. A completed individual activity report form must be submitted to the DSD District Chairman of Consulting Rosarians by the date designated by the District Chairman.

After passing the open book written exam, the new CR then receives a date for the completion of their next four-point audit. CRs are required to accrue **four credits** (including Chemical Safety/Pesticides) **in four years** by either attending approved seminars for CR credits or by auditing an approved CR school before the end of December of their audit year. A Consulting Rosarian ribbon badge is available from ARS Headquarters for those who have met the school and test requirements. School receipt certificates are required to obtain the badge.

Complete, verbatim text of requirements is available in the <u>Consulting Rosarian Manual</u>, Revised July 2015, which can be downloaded for free in pdf format from the American Rose Society (http://www.rose.org/wp-content/uploads/2010/03/CR-MANUAL-REVISED-8-2016-FINAL.pdf) or Deep South District web sites.


