Congratulations to our District's newest accredited CRs who took the exam. Our National speakers kept us well-informed on how our mother society (the American Rose Society) is doing and things that are in the works. Thanks to *Pat Shanley, Bob Martin, Jon Corkern*, and all the ARS staff the future of ARS is looking very bright.

Our business meeting went very well with only one issue that had mixed reactions. The Perpetual Trophy storage has been on the agenda for several meetings, and now finally has a positive vote by the council's voting delegates representing their individual societies. We now can move forward in finding a new and better way of presenting these awards at our DSD Fall Conventions. The council also approved moving forward with an all-voluntary DSD directory. Details of this will be sent to all District Presidents. The suggestion for a \$50 per society donation to ARS

to help in the refurbishing process of our DSD Memorial Rose Garden at the American Rose Center in Shreveport was approved. If the suggested amount is out of the question then send what your society can afford; individual member donations are also appreciated as well. A \$1000 donation from our District is what we are hoping to send, and this will go a long way in buying new plants and landscape materials. Send your donations to our District Garden Fund Chair, *Don Schwarz*, made payable to the Deep South District. *Don Schwarz*'s address is 3388 Lennox Court, Lawrenceville, GA 30044-5616. This will be one project we can be proud of as we help make the ARS Rose Center beautiful for the many visitors that come to the ARS gardens each year. The last item that was voted on and approved was the wording adjustment in the DSD Guidelines for Conventions and Rose Shows. This adjustment pertained to line item 14 of the guidelines, which addresses how convention profits are shared with the DSD Treasury. These can and should be viewed on the DSD website, particularly by potential convention host societies.

There were several "for information only" items on the agenda as well. These were not voted on; they are just items to be thinking about for future actions.

- Need to find a new awards chairman for term 2018-2021.
- How the 2018 Mini National will affect our Fall 2018 Convention.
- The need for a 2019 Fall Convention & Rose Show host.
- Future Mid-Winter hosts: 2019 Tampa Rose Society, 2020 Marion County Rose Society. These two MWMs are presently being planned to be in Gainesville again.

It was announced that *Cindy Dale* will be seeking the District Director position for term 2018–2021, while *Ralph* will be running for the Regional Director for Region 3. Region 3 is all of the Deep South District plus the Tenarky District for a total of a six-state geographical involvement. Please keep the two of us in mind when it comes time to vote. As of this writing neither of us has opposition.

In the ARS 125<sup>th</sup> Birthday Celebration prize drawing our District won one of the prizes. All 18 Districts appear to have been in on the drawings, but I have not seen a posted winners list as of yet [see page 27]. I hope perhaps a few from our District may be winners as well. Jean and I both entered in hopes of being picked, but it is by chance whose names are drawn. Our District won a book by Mike Shoup, *Empress of the Garden*. I plan to offer this book for the Mini National raffle drawing in May; who knows, you may be the big winner there.

# Remembering Kitsy Mostellar

Kitsy Mostellar passed away on December 12, 2017, at the age of 82. She is survived by two sons, seven grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren. Kitsy was a native of Atlanta and loved her city. She and her husband, *Dr. Marvous Mostellar*, became involved in the early days of the Greater Atlanta Rose Society, which met on the grounds of the Atlanta Botanical Garden. At that time, the garden was barely developed, but it did have a beautiful rose garden, courtesy of the members of the rose society. She was instrumental in the development of a long-lasting and beneficial connection between the Botanical Garden and the Atlanta society that continues to this day. Kitsy learned from many fine rosarians during those years, and she and her husband began to attend district and national ARS conventions, becoming more and more involved.

She became an ARS Horticulture Judge, and enjoyed travelling throughout Georgia and the Deep South District and also judging at the district and national levels. Kitsy served two terms as President of the Greater Atlanta Rose Society in 1981 and 1990-1991. She received the Bronze Honor Medal in 1996. She served as Rose Show Chair and in many other capacities for her local society, as well as being an integral part of the planning for the national and Deep South District Conventions held in Atlanta, the most recent being in 2016. She was co-chair of the ARS National Convention in Atlanta in 2000. In 2017 the Greater Atlanta Rose Society awarded her a Lifetime Achievement Award for her many years of service.



In the 1980s Dr. Mostellar was elected to serve as Director for the Deep South District and at his untimely death, Kitsy was asked to complete his term of office. In addition to this, her services to the district were many and varied, including being an instructor in the judging schools, and in 1987, she was awarded the Silver Honor Medal. On the national level, she served on the ARS Membership Committee for many years, bringing distinction to her district and region. Also, as a member of the National Nominating Committee, Kitsy provided excellent input into the task of providing future leaders. She was Regional Director for Region 3 from 2003-2006, and from 2012-2015.



Kitsy loved her family, her church, her friends, and the rose. She and her husband especially loved Old Garden Roses and after his death, the family donated a beautiful perpetual trophy to be awarded for the best old-fashioned bouquet of Old Garden Roses in the Atlanta spring rose show. She served the American Rose Society, the Deep South District, and the Greater Atlanta Rose Society with devotion and intelligence. She had a large reservoir of common sense and a good dose of "no nonsense". Her opinions were always worth listening to, based as they were on her plentiful experience, and on her sound judgment. Kitsy was gregarious by nature, enjoyed telling stories about her rose adventures, and loved nothing better that a long pow-wow with her rose friends. Anyone who observed her at rose events would soon notice that, as a friend said, "Kitsy knows everyone, and everyone knows Kitsy."

She will be greatly missed, but never forgotten.

# Remembering Lee Hale

Lee C. Hale, age 87, passed away February 2, 2018, in Griffin, GA. She was born May 3, 1931, in Moultrie, GA, daughter of the late Isaac Lee Collins and Hilda Herdon Collins. She was married to the late Forrest Hale, Sr. She is survived by her son and daughter-in-law, Forrest Hale, Jr., and Polly Hale: two grandchildren, Forrest Hale III, Carrie and Blake Baugus; and two great grandchildren, Poppy Baugus and Hazel Baugus.

Lee joined the American Rose Society in 1993, and became a Consulting Rosarian in 1996; in 2006, Lee stepped up to Master Rosarian status. She was also an American Rose Society Accredited Horticultural Judge and Arrangements Judge. Lee was awarded the Outstanding Horticultural Judge and Arrangement Judge for 2013 by the Deep South District. This was because of her willingness to judge shows in any part of the District or nation and her extensive knowledge of both horticulture and rose arranging.

Lee was deeply involved with the Middle Georgia Rose Society. She served two terms as President and one as First Vice President, and was the newsletter editor. She was also a member of the South Metro (Atlanta) Rose



Society, which she served as Secretary. SMRS meetings were a 90-minute drive through dark, back roads from her home in Jackson, GA, yet she rarely missed one. She served both societies as rose show Chair of Arrangements. She was best known as an arranger with a special interest in Oriental-style designs. She served on the National ARS Arrangement Judging Committee and assisted in writing the guidelines for arrangements judging. She presented and assisted at arrangements schools and workshops at national ARS conventions, District events, judges' schools, and at local societies.



Lee received the ARS Bronze Honor Medal from the South Metro Rose Society for service to the local society. She also was awarded the ARS Silver Honor Medal from the Deep South District in 2017 for meritorious service to the rose and its culture, and for efforts expended in support of the American Rose Society and its objectives within the District.

She will be missed.

# Recipes? Oh My!

We don't usually share recipes in *The Bulletin*, but these are special...

**Rose Water** – you will need to distill slowly one pound of whole rose petals, fully developed, with one quart water. One technique described in The Wild Sprout blog (<a href="https://thewildsprout.com/blog/rosewaterdiy">https://thewildsprout.com/blog/rosewaterdiy</a>) suggests:

- Gently remove the petals from your roses (preferably unsprayed). Separate
  the petals from the stem and remove any stamens that may have been picked
  with the petals.
- Place a clean brick in the middle of your pot, then place a bowl on top of the brick
- Place rose petals into the pot around the brick, making sure not to place any in the bowl. Pour distilled water into the pot over the petals until it rises to the top of the brick.
- Invert the lid of your pot; this will allow the steam to collect at the top and funnel down to the center of the lid, allowing it to drop into the bowl. Place ice on top of the lid. This will encourage the steam to condense quickly and, in turn, drop into the bowl.
- Bring the water to a gentle boil, then reduce heat to the lowest setting that allows the water to simmer, for at least 20 minutes.
- Carefully remove the lid, making sure the liquid from the ice cubes does not drip into your pot. A
  turkey baster can be used to remove the melted ice from the lid before moving it. Cool the rose
  water in the bowl, then pour into a clean glass vessel.

This method won't be quite as good as the imported rose water you can



buy in specialty food shops, because our modern hybrid roses aren't as rich in oils as the ones used in Egypt. (Hot house roses will not work in this recipe.)

**Rose Syrup** – Combine four cups sugar, two cups water, and two cups light corn syrup. Simmer the sugar, water, and corn syrup for 20 minutes. When cool, add 10 teaspoons rose water, one teaspoon lemon juice, and a little red food coloring and stir. Pour into sterilized bottles with screw caps. Store in a cool dry place.

**Rose Extract** – To one quart vodka add two cups rose petals. After shaking thoroughly, leave the jar to stand for two weeks in a cool, dark place. By this time the petals will have lost their color. Drain off the liquid and discard the old petals. To the reserved liquid add one cup fresh rose petals. Leave for two more weeks. Drain again, discard old petals. Repeat process two more times.

# Horticulture Judges Review

It is time for your annual judge's report to be submitted. I have received a number of these reports but have not yet done a formal tabulation. I have been much distracted by the month-long visit of my stepdaughter's family that included two small children. A lot of things got put on the back burner during that time. I hope to do that tabulation soon and send out some reminders to those of you who are tardy. Please send me your reports as I am in process of updating the judges list on the DSD

website.

It is with sadness that I note the passing of longtime judge and active District member, *Katherine Mostellar*. "Kitsy" was a great lady and will be missed by all who knew her. The ranks of DSD judges continue to decline. Presently, there are three judges with active status in Alabama, 17 in Florida, and 19 in Georgia. We will be updating the judges list on the DSD website soon, so make sure your information is current. Local show chairs often use this list to find their judges.

We have a few judges within the District who have been placed on inactive status due to their failure to meet the audit requirement. For these judges, there is a one-year, electronic recertification system available. Contact me for information. A lapsed judge can also return to active status by taking a school or seminar.

We need to hold either a seminar or judging school to meet the audit needs of 18 of our DSD judges whose credentials expire at the end of 2018. If I can identify any candidates for a

school (potential apprentice judges), I will try to put one together later in the year. Please let me know quickly if you can identify such individuals. Otherwise, I will plan on holding a seminar either sometime this fall or at the upcoming Mid-Winter Meeting. I have recently taken over the presidency of the Central Rose Society so, along with dealing with small children, I have been distracted from my District duties. Putting together a 2018 DSD school/seminar is a high priority for me after putting together local society programs (we have no program chair at

present) and getting judging teams assembled for the Jacksonville Mini-National/DSD Convention in May. I plan to staff the judging teams with outside District Judges who make a request and fill the other slots with DSD judges.

As it is the middle of winter, there is not much going on in the rose garden. We had a rare freeze here in Orlando this year so I am delaying any cut-back for a few weeks as my roses recover. The upcoming Spring show season is quickly approaching. I hope to see you at many of these rose shows, either judging or exhibiting. Let's all hope we have lots of beautiful blooms to assess during the upcoming season.

# **Consulting Rosarian Report**

## **Consulting Rosarian Notes, March 2018**

**CONSULTING ROSARIAN SCHOOL:** The CR school at Mid-Winter, January 21<sup>st</sup> was standing-room-only until we rearranged and brought in more chairs. Congratulations to *Alba Sequeira* of the Greater Gwinnet Rose Society who has joined us as an official DSD and ARS Consulting Rosarian. Thanks to all of you who attended and participated.

By attending CR Credit seminars, including Pesticides and Chemical

Safety, 34 DSD CRs extended their currency to 2022, and two extended to 2021. Eighteen CRs stayed for the entire school and have also extended their currency to 2022. There are 13 of you whose currency will expire this year. I will e-mail you about your renewal options. If you want to check your currency, the February 2018 ARS master list of active DSD CRs should be posted on the DSD website by the time you receive *The Bulletin*.

CONSULTING ROSARIAN REPORTS: Thanks to everyone who submitted their 2017 CR Reports. Of 109 active CRs in the DSD, 61 of you sent me reports. However, that means 58 of you listed on the ARS and DSD rosters as active CRs have not accomplished the only "mandatory" responsibility beyond maintaining currency.

I discovered that your reports are not forwarded from the district level, and that their only function seems to be to help the District CR chair select nominees for Outstanding Consulting Rosarian of the year. Therefore, I modified the form to ask questions about your rose gardens, thinking I could consolidate the replies and offer feedback as to what is going on in the district.

Here are some statistics from the 56% who reported:

Seven CRs reported that they do not spray their roses at all. Another nine reported that they only spray for thrips, especially chilli thrips, meaning that 26% have gone no-spray except for pests lethal to rose plants. Chilli thrips are everywhere in Florida, most recently infesting roses in Tallahassee and Pensacola.

I should have known better than to ask for your favorite rose—'*Veterans' Honor*' led with three votes but the most votes went to the many "sports" of 'theone-in-bloom,' 'all,' 'most-fragrant,' 'the-ones-that-made-the-awards-table.'

What I learned from the "Five Most Disease-Resistant" question is that there is an amazing variety of roses thriving without spray in our district. Beyond the OGRs and 'Knock Outs' that are known for their disease resistance, you submitted an amazingly long list of roses that do well, or you suspect would do well, without spray in your gardens.

Several CRs who have always regularly sprayed pesticides admitted that they weren't sure whether any of their roses would thrive without spray. Our Director, *Ralph Stream*, reported: "In my opinion, all roses need at least some spraying to stay healthy."

Fifteen CRs reported that they do not exhibit, with four more explaining that they display their roses at local festivals but not ARS-sanctioned shows.

Wayne shared this photo of '*Crépuscule*', a Noisette rose from 1904. Its color is more intense in cooler weather than in summers.



Garden sizes were surprising. *Jill Haisten* of the Wiregrass and Ramer, Alabama, Rose Societies, who did such a great job as cochair of the Mid-Winter Meeting, is our rosediversity champion, growing approximately 300 different roses. Cindy Dale of South Metro, Harold Settle of Birmingham, Walt & Linda **Reed** of Greater Atlanta and South Metro, and Gene Waering of Jacksonville all grow over 200 varieties. I expected these large gardens, but the big surprise for me was that 11 CRs grow fewer than 10 varieties.

Only five reporting CRs admitted to not accomplishing Roses in Review. However, among the reviewers, over a third grew none of the listed varieties. Our District Director, Ralph Stream, was the leading reviewer, evaluating 40+ cultivars. Cindy Dale of South Metro won silver with 26 reports, and *Harold Settle* of Birmingham took the bronze with 25. Congratulations and thank you.

Saving the best for last, *Phil Paul* of the Bradenton-Sarasota RS deserves special praise,

congratulations, and cheers!! He recruited seven new members this year. Proving that other people are also having great success, Bill Chappell of Huntsville-Twickenham and Carol Wade of Tampa each brought in six new recruits, Diane Celeste of Bradenton-Sarasota found four, and four other CRs recruited three. All of you please keep up the recruiting efforts.

# Roses in Review

The 2017 Roses in Review (RIR) reporting process was plagued by complications this year, mainly due to problems with the RIR website which went down, came back up, and went down again. Because of this, the unprecedented decision was made to extend the reporting deadline to October 17<sup>th</sup>. It was frustrating for the

reporters, the district chairs, and the national chair so we'd like to extend an extra thank you and pat on the back to all you intrepid DSD rosarians who made the extra effort and perhaps tried several times to record your reviews. When the 2019 ARS Handbook for Selecting Roses comes out next September you will



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know that you provided the critical information that allowed this publication to go forward.

This year 96 DSD reporters contributed 282 reviews on 101 rose varieties or contributed by stating they grew none of the reviewable roses. This is a decrease of 12% over last year's 108 reporters. Consulting and Master Rosarians are no longer required to send in reviews to keep their certification but they are <a href="mailto:expected">expected</a> to participate. Fifty-four of our DSD CRs/MRs (out of a total of 109) participated this year. This translates to 50% of our CRs who reported compared to 38% two years ago and 56% last year.

As you see, we did have slight decreases in all categories this year but I attribute this mostly to the website problems. Even factoring this in, we still have much room for improvement. Considering that our district includes all the local societies of Alabama, Georgia, and Florida, 108 reporters is not nearly enough, and seven of the 18 ARS districts had a higher percentage of reporters than we did. Pages 1-2 of the *Consulting Rosarian Manual* state that, "Consulting Rosarians should be active in furthering the cause and interests of the American Rose Society in whatever way they can", but just half our CRs/MRs chose to do this through their RIR participation. Let's do better next year.

In the next newsletter, we'll break down the highest garden ratings by rose classification for our district to give you some suggestions for your spring purchases. Thanks again for your patience and your input in "Roses in Review."

- ❖ Websites/Social Media pages should have an administrator and at LEAST two others with log in credentials. Websites/URL Names should be the property of the Local Rose Society and not an individual member. This allows for continuity in the event that member leaves. I hear stories all the time where people leave rose societies and take the "keys" to the website or the Facebook page with them.
- ❖ Websites at a minimum should relate the following information:
  - Meeting times, location, and any upcoming events
  - A list of Consulting Rosarians and the services they offer to the community
  - How to become a member
  - How to contact the society
- ❖ Webmasters and Administrators on Facebook/Instagram/Twitter should work to protect the reputation of the local rose society and the American Rose Society by refraining from engaging in argumentative discussions about rose culture or topics related to growing roses that could be seen as controversial. It ultimately reflects badly on the individual and the society on a local and national level. Our overarching goal is to encourage new members to join us, not turn them away.
- ❖ With some good planning and a little common sense, local rose societies can maintain a presence on the web that will inform and encourage growth.



# 2018 DSD Mid-Winter Meeting

**January wouldn't be January** without the Mid-Winter Meeting. This year's featured hard-working hosts, an interesting and edifying collection of speakers, a photo contest, good food, and lots of friends to meet or refresh relationships with. And while we dodged the ice leaving Atlanta, the weather was much nicer in Gainesville. Winter vacation!

We started Friday with presentations on photography by *Cindy Dale* and *Bobbie Reed*, with tips to help those entering that day's photography contest. After judging *Alba Sequeira* had won Best in Show, Queen, and Gold Medal Certificate for her photo of '*Heavenly Rosalind*' and King and Silver Medal Certificate for her photo of '*Mme Laurette Messimy*'. *Jean Giesel* won Princess for her photo from the Melcher Garden in Virginia, and the Bronze Medal Certificate went to *Sara Coleman* for her photo of '*Cajun Moon*'. Snappy work, folks!

Saturday evening's dinner featured *Bob Martin*, ARS VP and incoming President, with an entertaining program, "If You Are Not Having Fun, You Are Doing Something Wrong". The Hospitality area was jammed afterwards. We also had time to hear from candidates for this year's ARS elections. *Chris VanCleave*, candidate for ARS Vice President spoke, but Dianne Sommers was unable to attend due to flu.

Dr. **Adam Dale** is an entomologist from the University of Florida Extension Service. He gave us a look at those insects likely to attack our roses: chilli thrips, aphids, spider mites, and rose scale. A frequent recommendation was to use less fertilizer – feeding the way we usually do results too much soft, new tissue. Since more effective pesticides like neonics are being removed from the homeowner market, we'll need to adjust our growing methods.

Chris VanCleave spoke about using social media to increase society membership. Possible forums include Facebook, Twitter, and Instagram, as well as podcasts like those at rosechat.com, and Youtube videos like those produced in Jacksonville. He recommends that you limit posts to once or twice a day, linking back to your website, stay focused on roses and rose society activities, and BE NICE!



Speakers at the MWM included Chris VanCleave, Bob Martin, Dr. Adam Dale, Bobbie Reed, Ralph Stream, Richard Anthony, and Cindy Dale.

**Richard Anthony** of For Love of Roses spoke on the process of hybridizing new roses. He suggests selecting parents based on substance (like florist roses), disease resistance, vigor, fragrance, and novelty. Again, he recommended fertilizing lightly if at all so that fertilized hips don't abort. He selects those seedlings that are singles with a large eye, are blooms with great form, have petals wider that they are long, have petals that feel like leather (not slippery), have novel color, or are otherwise unique. He noted that striped sports tend not to be stable; 90% of them will revert.

**Ralph Stream** had a long list of interesting new roses, some from lists compiled by Sandy Lundberg. Reviews varied, of course. And then we moved into the business portion of the meeting, and, of course, the raffle.


# What's Next?

His amateur hybridizing efforts have led to the introduction of



David's most recent introductions include the 2014 AoE winner 'Tammy Clemons' and the 2016 introduction 'Bold Ruler'.

**Bob Martin** [photo right] has been growing roses for more than 45 years. He and his wife Dona live in Escondido, CA, where they maintain a rose garden of more than 500 roses of all types. He is an American Rose Society Master Rosarian, an Accredited Horticultural Judge and an Accredited Arrangements Judge.

Bob is Vice President of the American Rose Society, the nation's largest plant society, which celebrated its 125<sup>th</sup> anniversary last year. In October 2018, he will automatically become the 56<sup>th</sup> President of the *American Rose Society* for a three year term.

Bob is well known as a humorous and effective speaker and rose evangelist, having spoken at 24 American Rose Society national conventions, at district conventions in 13 of the 18 ARS districts, and more than 250 times at rose societies and garden clubs.



Bob is also a prolific writer, having authored more than 600 published articles on roses. He is the National Editor of *Horizon Roses*, an annual review by the nation's top exhibitors of new exhibition roses. Bob is also the author of the book *Showing Good Roses* and maintains a website covering U.S. rose shows at <a href="https://www.roseshow.com">www.roseshow.com</a>. He was honored for his lifetime contribution to rose education as a 2009 recipient of the ARS Klima medal.

Bob is an active rose exhibitor at all levels and the 2007 recipient of the ARS Guy Blake Hedrick, Jr., Award for lifetime achievement in rose exhibiting. He is also a hybridizer with 12 registered varieties, including the show roses 'Butter Cream', 'Peter Cottontail', and 'Pasadena Star'. One of his latest roses is a pink sport of 'Randy Scott' that he named after his wife, 'Dona Martin'.

Bob is active in the San Diego Rose Society which he has served in several capacities, including two terms as President. In the past, he has served as the Pacific

Southwest District Director of the American Rose Society, and in numerous local, district, and national rose society positions. Bob is the recipient of the ARS Silver Honor Medal for service to the Pacific Southwest District, and three ARS Bronze Honor Medals for service to the San Diego Rose Society, Los Angeles Rose Society, and Pasadena Rose Society.
