Celebrating Special Roses!

Some roses need to be celebrated as well!

First, we have the winners at the ARS All-Mini/Miniflora Rose Show in Jacksonville in May. The Mini Queen was 'Soroptimist International' shown by Satish and Vijaya Prabhu [photo on the first page]. The Miniflora Queen was 'Nancy Jean' shown by Cindy Dale. The Hybrid Tea Queen was 'Dona Martin' shown by


Cindy Dale. The Floribunda Queen was 'Frida Kahlo' exhibited by Don Myers. The Harm Saville Memorial Challenge Bowl was won by Ray Gillebeau with a fabulous collection of 18 roses. The Top Gun Award was also won by Ray Gillebeau. The Frank A. Benardella Memorial Miniature Challenge was won by Satish & Vijaya Prabhu with seven queen-quality roses. You'll find photos throughout **The Bulletin**.

At the Saturday banquet, the American Rose Society Award of Excellence winners were presented. After two to three years of evaluation, the winners are 'Children's Hope' and 'Oso Easy Urban Legend'. 'Children's Hope' [photo above right from Weeks Roses] was hybridized by Tom Carruth and is introduced by Weeks Roses, classified as a shrub. Its old-fashioned blooms are medium red with light smoke on the edge, and more than 45 petals, borne on short stems in clusters. It has glossy, disease-resistant foliage. Its parents were 'Sweet Chariot' x ('Goldmarie' x 'Baby Bloomers').

'Oso Easy Urban Legend' [photo right from Spring Meadow Nursery] was hybridized by Christopher Warner of the UK and is introduced by Spring Meadow Nursery. Its blooms are medium red with 20-25 petals with no observable disease in the test gardens. It is classified as a miniature, with parents 'Pathfinder' x 'Radrazz'.

Also announced were the 2018 entries into the Miniature and Miniflora Rose Hall of Fame. 'Autumn Splendor' was hybridized by Michael

Williams, introduced by the Mini Rose Garden, and won the ARS Award of Excellence in 1999. It has yellow blooms with tints of orange and red, which are about two inches in diameter on a tall plant. It is a Miniflora. The second winner was '*Cachet*', a white Miniflora with 26-40 petals on a tall plant, hybridized by Robbie Tucker and introduced by Rose Hill Nursery in 1998.

400 Million New Roses!

The 21st of April was a red letter

day for rose lovers as 400 million new Peace Rose Forever stamps were released by the US Postal Service. Cindy and I were privileged to attend the First Day of Issue Dedication Ceremony, held in America's Rose Garden at the ARS Headquarters in Shreveport, Louisiana. First Day Ceremonies are held for each new postage stamp issued and include an unveiling with pertinent speakers and local and USPS officials, and are normally held at a location most relevant to the stamp being issued.



Speakers during this ceremony included Pat Shanley, ARS President; Bob Martin, ARS Vice-President; Laura Seabaugh, ARS Executive Director; Sonia Meilland-Gilbert, Grand-Daughter of Francis Meilland; and Brad Yoder, President of Star Roses and Plants.

Hybridized by Francis Meilland, the Peace Rose has a storied popular history, much of which has been glorified over the years in popular rose culture. Many accounts have the budwood for the rose being spirited away from advancing Nazis in France on one of the last planes leaving occupied France for the west in 1942. Bob Martin has done considerable historic research on the rose and its budwood was in fact sent to Italy, Germany, and a one pound parcel was sent to the American Consul in Lyons for delivery to Robert Pyle in Pennsylvania in 1939. He propagated the rose and included it in the All-American Rose

Selection Trials, receiving the highest score in the trials up to that time. The light yellow to cream color, along with vigorous, disease resistant bushes quickly caught everyone's attention. When the rose was named 'Peace' in 1945, Robert Pyle and other rosarians prepared the statement: "We are persuaded that this greatest new rose of our time should be named for the world's greatest desire: PEACE". Delegates to the United Nations Conference in San Francisco each received a specimen bloom with a note expressing the hope that the rose could influence their work toward world peace. 'Peace' became such a popular rose it had a critical part in the success of Conard-Pyle Nurseries and their ultimate growth into Star Roses. During the stamp ceremony the speakers related the important and accurate

history of the '*Peace*' Hybrid Tea, all surrounded by the newly updated America's Rose Garden that was in full splendor on a beautiful spring day. The

ceremony was even broadcast on one of the Shreveport television stations so many saw it in addition to the 300 or so attendees.

Particularly significant for the ARS is the fact the photograph used for the new stamp was taken by Rich Baer, a long time ARS member known widely within the ARS for his award-winning rose photographs. The full photograph was included on the ceremony program, an item cherished by stamp collectors as a reflection of the First Day of Issue Ceremony which includes one of the new stamps

with the first day cancel. These ceremonies are the only time that the USPS gives away actual postage. Choice of the stamp subject again emphasizes the importance of the rose as our national Floral Emblem, and although many times the US has issued stamps depicting roses, seldom is an actual named variety represented like '*Peace*'. Expected to be highly popular with the mailing public, 400 million of these were printed in panes of 20 self-adhesive stamps. So, every time you post a bill or letter you can spread the gospel of great roses!

Horticulture Judges Review

Kudos to the Jacksonville Rose Society for their sponsorship of an excellent combination Mini-National and Deep South District Convention and Rose Show, held at the Lexington Hotel in Jacksonville, Florida, on May 4-6, 2018. I was unable to attend many of the programs due to my duties as chair of horticultural judging, but understand they were excellent. There was good competition for the three National awards, two were won impressively by *Ray Guillebeau*. The efforts among

exhibitors to compete for the National awards certainly affected competition for the District awards, most having only a single entry. The major exception to that was competition for the Johnston Old Garden Bouquet Trophy, where there were several good entries. That was nice to see as there have been few entries in this class in recent years. The Hybrid Tea/Grandiflora, Miniflora, and Miniature single bloom classes received many excellent entries. The queens and their courts were beautiful.

We normally run a judging seminar or school in even years. Indeed, we have many judges in our District that need to complete their four-year audit requirement. Normally I would have either run a judging school in May or a seminar at the fall District Convention. My being out of the country during the early part of 2018 and work on the May Convention necessitated changing this usual pattern. Another complication is my upcoming retirement from this position at the end of October. We need a seminar for many of our judges this year and, if I am to run it, it must occur prior to October 29. We have been looking at potential venues and dates, but, so far have not secured either, although I think we are getting close. I had hoped to have the details worked out before **The Bulletin** was published but have been unable to do so. Right now, we are looking at a September date and most likely at a location near the Florida-Georgia line so as to limit travel time for everyone. When details are worked out and I have final ARS approval, I will e-mail all our current judges.

I have enjoyed my tenure as your Chair of Horticultural Judges but it is now time to pass this role on to someone else. I want to thank all of you for your support during my relatively long tenure in this position.




Membership Matters

Contest Rules

- 1. Contestants may enter up to 3 images per Class. Multiple entries of a rose variety within the same Class are not allowed.
- 2. Photos must be submitted in JPEG image format.
- 3. Images must be taken by an amateur photographer who is a member of the ARS and living in the Deep South District or a member of a local Rose Society located in the DSD.
- 4. Digital images that have won awards in previous ARS or DSD photography contests are not eligible.
- 5. Images must be identified by their ARS approved exhibition name.
- 6. Identify each image submitted by its Class and ARS approved exhibition name. Ex: Class 8 Abraham Darby.
- 7. E-mail questions/entries to Paul J. Colombo at: <u>pjcolombo1@gmail.com</u>. Include your name, home address, and phone number.
- 8. ENTRIES MUST BE RECEIVED BY November 1, 2018.
- 9. Receipt of entries will be confirmed by e-mail.

Classes





- #1: **One Hybrid Tea or Grandiflora** one bloom per stem, no side buds permitted, <u>exhibition</u> stage, no single-flowered cultivars.
- #2: **Hybrid Tea or Grandiflora Spray** must have two or more blooms. Single petalled Hybrid Teas or Grandifloras allowed.
- #3: **One fully open Hybrid Tea or Grandiflora** one bloom per stem, no side buds permitted, stamens must be visible. Single petalled Hybrid Teas or Grandifloras allowed.
- #4: **One Floribunda** one bloom per stem, no side buds permitted, <u>most perfect</u> phase of beauty.
- #5: Floribunda or Polyantha Spray must have two or more blooms.
- #6: **Old Garden Rose** one bloom per stem or spray, side buds permitted. Entries must be submitted with date of introduction. Two awards will be given: Dowager Queen for roses introduced before 1867 and Victorian Award for roses introduced in 1867 or later and for unknown date of introduction.
- #7: Shrub Rose Classic Shrubs (H. Kordesii, H. Moyesii, H. Rugosa, or H. Musk) or Modern Shrubs, one bloom per stem or spray, side buds permitted. No David Austin roses (see Class #8).
- #8: **David Austin Roses** one bloom per stem or spray, side buds permitted. Must be a David Austin introduction.
- #9: **Climber** Large Flowered Climbers, Hybrid Giganteas, and Hybrid Wichuranas, one bloom per stem or spray, side buds permitted.
- #10: Species Roses one bloom per stem or spray, side buds allowed. See Modern Roses [http://www.allthingsroses.org/modernroses], ARS Handbook for Selecting Roses, Official List of Approved Exhibition Names for Exhibitors and Judges, or visit www.helpmefindroses.com.
- #11: **One Miniature** one bloom per stem, no side buds permitted, <u>exhibition</u> stage, no single-flowered cultivars.
- #12: **One Miniflora** one bloom per stem, no side buds permitted, <u>exhibition</u> stage, no single-flowered cultivars.
- #13: **Miniature or Miniflora Spray** must have two or more blooms. Single petalled cultivars allowed.
- #14: **One fully open Miniature or Miniflora** one bloom per stem, no side buds permitted, stamens must be visible. Single petalled cultivars allowed.
- #15: **Any Arrangement** ANY class of rose. Must include arranger's name and name of roses.
- #16: **Macro Photography** any part of a rose photographed at extreme close range, may include insects.

American Rose Society Triennial Election

Important Election Information:

- YOU MUST HAVE A PAID ANNUAL MEMBERSHIP WITH ARS. Corporate, Complimentary, District, Libraries, Youth, E-members and Trial members cannot vote.
 Societies are allowed one vote.
- YOU MUST HAVE A WORKING EMAIL ADDRESS on file with ARS as stated
 in the Jan/Feb and Mar/Apr magazines to be eligible to vote. Associate members must
 also have a working email address to be eligible to vote. This can be a friend's email
 address.



- ALL BALLOTS ARE NOW ELECTRONIC. Ballots will not be mailed. All ballot materials will be dispensed electronically via secure website (a third party election company-Intelliscan, Inc.) CHECK YOUR EMAIL (JUNK & SPAM FOLDERS).
- VOTING BEGINS at 9:00 a.m. Central on June 1, 2018 and ends at 12 noon Central on July 27, 2018.
- YOU WILL RECEIVE AN EMAIL FROM INTELLISCAN, INC. with a personalized link to vote.

At the onset of the election, Intelliscan will send personalized emails to ARS members with functioning email addresses. The message will list instructions for voting online, along with a personalized embedded hyperlink that will take members directly to their ballot. Each voter must sign in to the voting page separately and use their own embedded hyperlink. (Members, Associates & Societies will receive their own separate emails).

The ARS election site will be designed so that members will click on the personalized embedded link from one of the email distributions and automatically access their personalized ballot.

The online ballot will include the slates that the members are eligible to vote on. The voter will be able to click on a candidate's name to view his or her biography.

PHOTO CONTEST FOR HIGH SCHOOL & MIDDLE SCHOOL STUDENTS

Contestants are permitted to enter a maximum of three digital photographs per category in all categories. Duplicate photos may NOT be entered in different categories.

Digital photographs must be .jpeg files and must be high resolution files with at least 4 megapixel resolution. The high resolution is necessary to ensure that winning entries will print properly in the magazine. Low resolution digital files will not be considered for awards.

The entrants must be in junior high or senior high school by the deadline. Those individuals who have graduated in 2018 are eligible. The year that you will be a graduate from high school MUST be included on the entry form.

All photographs entered must have been taken by the student.

Photographs which have won awards in previous ARS Digital Photo Contests are not eligible.

Grooming the rose(s) is encouraged and artificial backgrounds may be used.

Digital photographs shall be saved in the following format: category number with the letters a-c for multiple pictures in the same class, last name of the contestant and the name of the rose or garden if it is known. If not known, please label as "unknown". An example would be 10c-Aumiller-Unknown. Only one entry would be 10a-Aumiller-Unknown. Any added text that is on the photo itself will be cause for disqualification. This includes date, time, etc.

Digital photographs may be enhanced by the use of any graphic program, such as Photoshop, Elements, Photo Impact, etc.

The chair of the committee reserves the right to disqualify any entry that does not conform to the stated rules prior to the entries being judged.

ENTRIES MUST BE RECEIVED BY JUNE 30, 2018.

Entries can be downloaded to Dropbox and submitted to americanrosephoto@yahoo.com or by mailing a CD or thumb drive to Curtis Aumiller, 5 Brentwood Rd, Camp Hill PA 17011.

When submitting digital pictures on CD or thumb drive, they must be placed in one directory folder. Make sure they can be read by a Windows-compatible computer and are properly packaged for safe delivery. Photos that are in a "program" to be viewed will be disqualified. E-mailed photos will NOT be accepted but Dropbox will be acceptable.

All entries MUST be accompanied by the completed entry form. Entries received without the completed entry form will be disqualified.

The CD/DVD/Drive will not be returned and should have the contestant's name, email, and address printed on the CD/DVD/Drive.

Any individual that enters this contest gives express permission for the American Rose Society to reproduce their photographs for educational and/or display purposes with a credit line to the photographer whenever possible. The photographer retains the copyright of the photo. The American Rose Society may use the photograph in any publication or magazine, but will not sell the photograph. Any inquiries about sale of the photograph will be referred to the photographer.

Categories

- 1: One bloom of any rose. There should not be other roses or buds in the photograph.
- 2: One rose, fully open, stamens must show. There should not be other roses or buds in the photograph.
- **3:** One spray, two or more blooms, any rose. There MUST be at least two rose blooms of the same variety. A spray is when a rose bush has multiple blooms coming from one single stem.
- **4:** Color Abstract or Impressionism: The photograph should evoke a sense of originality; a new and different way of imagining the rose or roses with the mind's eye. This may include processes used to alter the original image such as texturizing, dodging, burning, dithering, painting, shadowing, blurring, layering, cloning, filtering, merging, cropping, selective colorization, etc.
- **5: Black & White Abstract or Impressionism**: The photograph should evoke a sense of originality; a new and different way of imagining the rose or roses with the mind's eye. This may include processes used to alter the original image such as texturizing, dodging, burning, dithering, painting, shadowing, blurring, layering, cloning, filtering, merging, cropping, use of sepia tones, etc.
- **6:** A photo of any rose garden: Photographs should show the use of roses within the structure of a garden, which can be widely variable. Roses should dominate in the photograph, and some layout of the garden should be visible.
- **7: Macro Photography**: Photograph should be an EXTREME close-up photo of any part of the rose or rose plant. Color, Black & White, Sepia, or combinations of these are permitted in this class.

Judging

The judging panel will consist of ARS accredited rose judges who are photographers.

All categories will be judged on photographic excellence and originality only. The ruling of the judges is final.

Awards

There will be four ribbons awarded in each class IF warranted. The judges reserve the right not to award a first place award if the entries do not merit such an award.

The winner of best in class will be awarded an ARS Trial Membership and the winning photos will then be judged against each other to determine 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place Best in Show. There will be a cash award of \$120 for 1st place, \$70 for 2nd place, \$40 for 3rd place, and \$20 for 4th place. The names and photos of each best in class winner will be published in American Rose magazine.
