District Director's Message for June 2020


What a strange spring we've all had! Normally in this message I'd be imploring everyone to participate

Remembering our GGRS President, Alba Sequeria January 2019, April 2020

Alba Sequeíra Apríl 6, 1964 - Apríl 20, 2020

Alba Sequeira joined the Greater Gwinnett Rose Society in 2013 at an outreach program at the *Family Tree Nursery* in Snellville. Alba had wanted to grow roses for a long time, but as she always said, 'I'm very good at killing them'. Alba joined the rose society to try to be a better rosarian. Her mother who had grown roses was her inspiration and where her love of roses was cultivated.



Alba grew most of her roses in pots. She had these huge half barrel pots (from Costco!) and had huge roses like 'New Dawn' and 'Lady Banks' in them. She loved small roses like 'Popcorn' and singles like 'The Alexandra Rose'. She also loved her 'William Lobb' and took many pictures of the moss-covered buds.

Alba was a fantastic photographer and won many photography awards at local and district shows. She took all of her photos on an iPhone and printed them herself. Alba and I attended the Mini-National Conference and Rose Show in Jacksonville in 2019 and she actually brought her printer with her and was up all night before the show printing pictures to enter.

She specialized in the Macro and Digitally Altered photos. She also won many photography awards at the 2018 DSD Photo

Trips with Alba could be fun. Two years ago, she and I and two other GGRS members (Nancy Miller and Rani Von Württemberg) took a 'road trip' to Laurens, South Carolina because *Roses Unlimited* was having a great sale. We went home with about 50 roses, filling up the back of Alba's huge Ford Explorer. Of course, Alba brought packing materials, with labels, so we could bag and label each rose which made it easier to figure out who's was who's when we got home.

There were also District shows and Mid-Winter Meetings. Alba always had an interesting outfit to wear on banquet night. She did most of her shopping on Amazon.

Alba was a very generous person. She gave so much to GGRS in both her time, effort and material items. Alba was very sharp and was always thinking of new ways to do things. She was also highly organized and took charge of printing out the category cards for our local GGRS Rose Show, which included keeping track of all the categories and the certificates. She also did this for the clerking supplies and the judges' handout

Most of all, Alba was a good friend. She was always there to listen to you if you had a problem and was willing to give advice on any subject. She had passion about everything she did. When she became President of the Greater Gwinnett Rose Society in January of 2019, she had so many ideas to

implement. Unfortunately, about a month later she received her diagnosis and was not able to be at any GGRS meetings. She would still chime in on email thread about Rose Society doings and wanted to know everything that was going on. We would send her pictures from shows we were attending or any outings or District meetings. We wanted her to live vicariously through us. It was our way of keeping her involved and trying to take her mind off of her illness. She fought so hard this past year, but for her it was all about quality of life. And she lived as hard as she could until the end. The same passion she had for roses and photography helped her through her trials until she was released from the prison her body had become.

I will remember Alba as her namesake, Alba Rugosa ('*R. rugosa alba*'). Single petalled, strong fragrance and a bit exotic. She had '*R. rugosa alba*' in a pot. When Rani and I went to prune her roses this spring, we thought it was dead, but it wasn't! A week later it had a nice bloom. That's Alba, she will stay with us in our memories

America's Rose Garden Journal – Marilyn Wellan

Here is a sneak preview of the second issue of America's Rose Garden Journal, which should go out early next week. One of the stories is about the Deep South District Garden. The large expansion of the garden was finished last week with the planting of about sixty 'Knock Out' varieties – all ten of them – in order to give us a good story to tell—the story of the revolutionary new shrub rose that changed the rose industry. This planting will make a great impact in that corner of the garden. We also have a small planting of the new miniature 'Petite Knock Out'.

Deep South District Garden Features the Knock Out Family of Roses

Work continues on the restoration of the long-standing Deep South District Garden, which has been generously supported by members and local rose societies of the district. The garden is located in the "Sustainability"* section of the core garden.

The site will feature the "Knock Out Family of Roses" the rose collection that began with the introduction in 1999 by Star Roses & Plants of the cherry red 'Knock Out' hybridized by William Radler.

The original 'Knock Out' took the rose world by storm. It was followed in 2004 by historic successes with 'Double Knock Out', 'Pink Knock Out' and 'Blushing Knock Out'. In 2007, the prolific Radler created Pink Double Knock Out', 'Sunny Knock Out' and 'Rainbow Knock Out'. Then in 2008, the team began to introduce roses with multiple names: 'Carefree Celebration' is also known as Coral Knock Out; 'The Peachy Keen Rose' is also known as Peachy Knock Out and Peachy Keen; and in 2009, 'White Out', is also known as White Knock Out. All of the above roses are classed as shrubs. The most recent Knock Out variety to be introduced by Star Roses & Plants is not a shrub, but a miniature rose – 'The Petite Knock Out'; it is the first "Knock Out' variety not attributed to Radler, but to the House of Meilland.

There is no question the "Knock Out" series of roses took the rose industry in a new direction. Advertised as the rose with the "most flower power of any shrub on the market – more than other roses, more than *anything* else," the collection has been the most successful rose story in history, and has earned a prominent place in our gardens as we tell the "history of the rose in America."

Let's Get those Photos Ready Now for the DSD 2020 Photo Contest!

I get a lot of email every day, and I don't wish to miss anyone's entries this year.

We all have seen programs on photography, and I hope many more people enter. We all have those Monday Queens, and many of us have a phone with a camera that is more than adequate to take an outstanding photo. If you have any public domain photo editors, or are savvy in Photoshop, or one of the many photo editing suites you can "groom" your photo to perfection there, but really all many needs is a crop and a bit of exposure adjusting. There are many camera apps that turn your phone into a very flexible camera, they are a few dollars and well worth the expense.

If you're in need of some online instruction, there are plenty of "You Tube" videos that are a wealth of information, you can take many of the hints and helps and apply them to our rose photo contest easy enough.

Just remember to watch harsh shadows, and distracting back grounds, feel free to groom the rose on the bush, or off the bush in a studio setting.

If you have any questions feel free to email, text, or call me, I try to make myself available. Remember to rename them and make sure they are a JPG. Last year I had many entries that were not sent correctly, please try to do this, I know there are a lot of different phones out there, and each is a little bit different on how they deal with images, but again, the internet is a wealth of information, please learn to rename your photos, it will help a lot. Feel free to test something out with me. You also don't need to wait until the last week in October to send them, they can be sent anytime between now and the deadline. I sort them as I get them.

2020 Deep South District Photo Contest rules.

Contest Rules

1. Contestants may enter up to 3 images per Class. Multiple entries of a rose variety within the same Class

are not allowed.

2. Photos must be submitted in JPEG image format.

3. Images must be taken by an amateur photographer who is a member of the ARS and living in the Deep

South District or a local Rose Society located in the DSD.

4. Digital images that have won awards in previous ARS or DSD photography contests are not eligible.

5. Images must be identified by their ARS approved exhibition name on the file name.

6. Identify each image submitted by its Class and ARS approved exhibition name. Ex: Class 8 - Abraham

Darby.

- 7. Email questions/entries to Paul J. Colombo at: <u>pjcolombo1@gmail.com</u>. Include your name, home address, and phone number. Please put, **"DSD 2020 Photo Contest"** in the subject line.
- 8. ENTRIES MUST BE RECEIVED BY November 1, 2020.

9. Reception of entries will be confirmed by email.

Classes

- #1: One Hybrid Tea or Grandiflora one bloom per stem, no side buds permitted, <u>exhibition</u> stage, no singleflowered cultivars.
- #2: Hybrid Tea or Grandiflora Spray must have two or more blooms. Single petalled HT's or GR's allowed.
- #3: One fully open Hybrid Tea or Grandiflora one bloom per stem, no side buds permitted, stamens must be visible. Single petalled HT's or GR's allowed.
- #4: One Floribunda one bloom per stem, no side buds permitted, most perfect phase of beauty.
- #5: Floribunda or Polyantha Spray must have two or more blooms.
- #6: Old Garden Rose's one bloom per stem or spray, side buds permitted. Entries must be submitted with date of introduction. Dowager Queen for roses introduced before 1867
- #7: Old Garden Rose's one bloom per stem or spray, side buds permitted. Entries must be submitted with date of introduction. Victorian Award for roses introduced in 1867 or later and for unknown date.
- #8: Shrub Rose Classic Shrubs (H. Kordesii, H. Moyesii, H. Rugosa, or H. Musk) or Modern Shrubs, one bloom per stem or spray, side buds permitted. No David Austin roses (see Class #8).
- #9: David Austin Roses one bloom per stem or spray, side buds permitted. Must be a David Austin introduction.
- #10: Climber Large Flowered Climbers, Hybrid Giganteas, Ramblers, and Hybrid Wichuraianas, one bloom per stem or spray, side buds permitted.

- #11: Species Roses one bloom per stem or spray, side buds allowed. See Modern Roses, ARS Handbook for Selecting Roses, Official List of Approved Exhibition Names for Exhibitors and Judges, or visit www.helpmefindroses.com.
- #12: One Miniature one bloom per stem, no side buds permitted, exhibition stage, no single-flowered cultivars.
- #13: One Miniflora one bloom per stem, no side buds permitted, exhibition stage, no single-flowered cultivars.
- #14: Miniature or Miniflora Spray must have two or more blooms. Single petalled cultivars allowed.
- #15: One fully open Miniature or Miniflora one bloom per stem, no side buds permitted, stamens must be visible. Single petalled cultivars allowed.
- #16: Any Arrangement ANY class of rose. Must include arranger's name and name of roses.
- #17: Macro Photography any part of a rose photographed at extreme close range, may include insects.
- #18: Abstract or Impressionist Photography a photo having non-objective, design, form, or content of a rose(s) or any part of a rose. May be digitally manipulated.
- #19: The Rose Garden a photo taken of a garden prominently featuring roses.
- #20: Novice/Youth Class any rose from an entrant who has not won an award (1st, 2nd, 3rd, or Hon. Mention) from a DSD or ARS Photo Contest.

Rose Shows Go Virtual!

Humans are adaptable. We've seen this happen during this Corona Virus crisis. As Rose Gardeners, we have also learned to be adaptable. When our meetings and Rose Shows have been cancelled, some of our more entrepreneurial types took matters into their own hands and come up with modern day solutions.

Rose Shows are the life blood of our Societies. It's our Debutante Ball, our Wedding, Our Sweet Sixteen. It's our chance to show off what we've worked so hard on all year. It's a chance to be recognized for this. It's also a chance for us to get together and

show the public what we do.

This year, all that was cancelled. As the country began to shut down in March, that pretty much did away with any Spring Rose Shows. Gatherings of more than a few people were strongly discouraged, so it was thought best to cancel these shows.

The Greater Atlanta Rose Show, held on Mother's Day weekend at the Atlanta Botanical Garden, is a fixture in the city's schedule. Each year hundreds of people attend the show to see

real garden grow roses, arrangements, gawk at the trophies and awards and even go home with some prize blooms on the last day. So, when the show was cancelled, Greater Atlanta Rose Society decided to go virtual.

President Christopher Huffer and Barry McCasland took the initiative to hold this first of its kind Rose Show.

The process was simple, you photograph your entries in a vase, just like it would be at a show. One straight on picture and one from above showing the bloom form. You then email the photos (labelled with class and rose name) to the show email. The website had the entries displayed. Then at a certain date, the entries were cut off and the judging began. A week later we had the results.

As you can imagine, there was a lot of work involved in this.
