District Director's Report



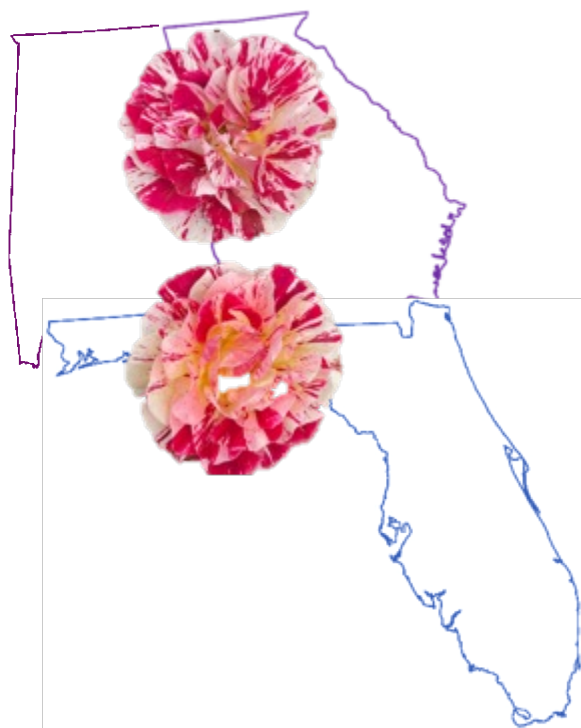

The Gainesville Rose Society is getting excited and busy making plans for a good experience for all our event attendees. Our hotel is under new management, so things have changed from the way we were accustomed to dealing with them in years past. However, this will not have any negative results for hotel guests. This event, being during the football season, pricing usually goes up, a result of supply and demand. They have, however, given us a nice registration room rate. We are working hard to keep the cost down as much as possible. The hotel is currently at a 50% capacity, so plan to register early. Hopefully all restrictions will be lifted by October to accommodate everyone.

Our Convention and Show dates are October 15-17, 2021. These dates will make some exhibitors very happy, while others not so much. The thing is with our District being so large, a few will not be happy with the dates; even we have experienced this. Even so, we will still have a nice rose show and hope you can participate.

As for programs and registration, we have worked hard to bring all this together for the Summer Bulletin. We currently have four speakers lined up for Saturday for your enjoyment. Consulting Rosarian credits will be available for all programs. Check out the Schedule of Events attached. Registration is also attached. After the workshop we will be needing help from as many as possible to set up the show starting at 4:00 pm. Please plan to help if you can with either, Horticultural, Arrangements or Photo set up. Dinner will be on our own with the Hospitality open at 7pm. The Hospitality will be held in the Presidential Suite which has a balcony over the pool. Exhibitors will have the evening to do some pre-prep for showing their roses and arrangements. Saturday will start early with the rose show prep open at 6:00am and the first speaker at 10:00am. We will have our raffle at 4pm after the speakers and we do hope your society and individuals will contribute to the raffle. Our Gainesville club team will be working on it later this year, so please be thinking how you can give support. We will be offering three Sunday morning/afternoon drive yourself tours. Two are the Kanapaha Botanical Gardens here in Gainesville City limits, and the Butterfly Rainforest @ UF (both with small entrance fees). The

other is an open garden tour of Ralph and Jean Stream's home and garden. The Streams will be open and ready from 9:00 am – 3:00 pm for your convenience.

Jacksonville scrapped plans for a fall show citing venue issues. (Apparently, the date conflicts with the Florida/Georgia game.) The Deep South District has a limited participation event planned in Tallahassee at

Goodwood, June 19th. After that, the DSD Fall Convention and Rose Show will take place in Gainesville, October 15th & 16th. So, fellow arrangers, we do have places to learn and exhibit, finally.

I am happy to report that all three of our district's apprentice arrangement judges have been busy judging rose shows. To their credit, they jumped at the few chances there were. Don't forget to extend them an invitation to judge, or allow them if they ask to judge. Remember, they have five shows or more (10, if they also have to do horticulture) to apprentice before they are accredited judges. [Only apprentice judges may ask to judge. Fully accredited judges may not ask to judge, that being considered poor manners. The only exception is national shows – let the host society know you are available and willing only. Do not assume. Last minute changes sometimes occur. Be a good sport.]

Don't forget our American Rose Society National Rose Convention and Rose Show, September 10th – 14th, in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. Just staying at the Pfister Hotel is reason enough to go. The roses will be awesome with arranging and judging opportunities. There is also an arrangement workshop on September 12th. If you missed the workshop at our Jacksonville National in 2018, you'll definitely want to go to this one, being led by the one and only, Kreg Hill. Trust me, he is entertaining if nothing else. I hope to see you there.

Consulting Rosarian Report

Hello, let me introduce myself.... Yes, I'm back. The thing about being a Consulting Rosarian is that you find yourself saying YES when someone needs rose help. (You are, aren't you?) In this case, Linda Schuppener was finding herself overwhelmed by her many responsibilities, so I agreed to step into her shoes as CR Chair. I've been a CR chair before, but that was fourteen years ago. I was immediately impressed with how the job has changed, so please bear with me while I learn how to do it all over again.

I'll try to share information with you in a timely manner. For instance, did you know there is an update on the CR Manual available? If the latest copy you have is a couple of years, or a couple of decades old, it's time to splurge on a new one. How much will the update cost? Nothing, if you download it from the ARS website; you'll find it at <https://www.rose.org/publications>. If you want a preprinted edition, it only costs \$10 (look under the SHOP tab). I'm amazed at all the new information. It behooves all of us to review the Manual periodically. You're bound to learn something new!

Learning is important. We've had a number of virtual Consulting Rosarian classes available in the last year. I wasn't able to see them all, but the ones I did were enlightening. I've never been to a CR school that I didn't learn something new, so don't pass up an opportunity to attend. We're planning an in-person school at the 2021 MidWinter Meeting, and there may be more virtual schools this fall and occasional local society programs for CR credit. Please plan to attend one or more.

One of the great bugaboos of CR-dom is coming up soon: Roses in Review. ***Consulting and Master Rosarians are highly encouraged to participate in the review process as part of their duties.*** So come July, look in the **American Rose** or on the ARS website to see which roses are available to review, and do so. If you grow none of these roses, you need to register anyway and check the box that says you don't grow any of the roses; that will take only a couple of minutes. Last year, only 60% of DSD CRs and MRs participated. We need to do better than that, and we can do much better. We all use and share the **Handbook for Selecting Roses**; it can only be accurate if we all provide our input. Please do so!

Get out there and enjoy your gardens this summer. Enjoy your role as a rose mentor (it helped to keep me sane for the last year). Help your local society when they ask you. And love those roses!



Plants Are the New Toilet Paper

Remember the Great Toilet Paper Panic of 2020? Of course, you do. The horror is seared upon your brain – the long lines, the empty shelves, the search for alternatives (cruise guides?), and the nagging guilt for never having splurged for a bidet. It was ghastly.

That trauma may be behind us (see what I did there?), but another ominous threat lurks on the horizon. Friends of mine in the green industry are posting about an impending nationwide shortage of plants. They're calling their usual wholesale suppliers to get ready for the spring planting season and being told they may have to wait until May or longer.

We're not talking only about a paucity of euonymus, cotoneaster, privet, English ivy, blue rug juniper, and other garbage plants here. We're talking about pretty much everything – annuals, perennials, trees, shrubs, ground covers, and seeds. So if you're planning on ordering anything special online or through the mail, stop whatever you're doing, and PLACE AN ORDER NOW. There is not a moment to waste.

Why Is This Happening? Like most terrible things taking place now, the plant shortage has its roots in COVID. I surmise the following factors are involved, though there may be others.

The housing boom. Many people are no longer enamored of living in a big city. They view city life as unhealthy, unsafe, and unaffordable, so they're moving to the suburbs in a big way. New houses need new plants – lots of 'em.

Working from home means no more excuses. Guys used to be able to avoid yard work by saying things like, "I just need a few hours to unwind" or "Thanks to some idiot whose car hit a moose and caught fire, I was stuck in traffic for 13 hours!" No more. Now when the missus reminds you in a particularly unkind way that those bushes in front of the houses have been dead since the Clinton years, you make a beeline to the garden center to escape the line of fire.

You are bored out of your ever-loving mind. Current highlights of your day include checking for the mail, checking again a half-hour later in case you missed it, squealing with rapture at the approach of the mail truck, retrieving the mail, and then assessing and sorting each piece for proper priority in the opening ceremony. All of this takes approximately 10 minutes, so you think, "Maybe I should listen to Grumpy for once and try to grow something. That will take up some time."

You have been cooped up in the house with the kids for the better part of a year and, frankly, you're sick of them. They wallow in last week's clothes while they text their friends for 16 hours a day and use the rest of the time whining about their needs, the most pressing of which are new ear buds, new hair, and more interesting parents. You distract them from their ennui by announcing a new project – growing things from seeds. Each day they can stare at the pot and

(Local societies with 100 or more members are asked to pay \$50/year and those with less than 100 members are asked for only \$25/year.)

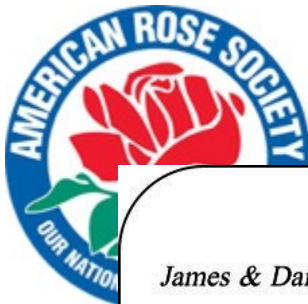

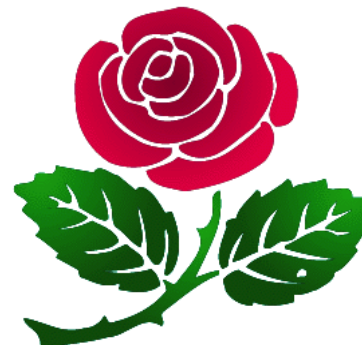

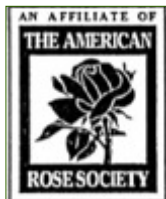
