## **Tampa Rose Society 50<sup>th</sup> Rose Show**

### *Tampa Rose Society- short history*

As current president of the Tampa Rose Society (TRS), I feel privileged and honored to accept the ARS citation presented by Ralph Stream, Region Director of DSD, on the occasion of our 50th Rose Show May 7, 2022. Many local rosarians can celebrate in this occasion that started when our organization was incorporated in 1972.

Our society, along with many others from the southeast U.S has been educating existing and new rosarians, growing beautiful roses and exhibiting them in Tampa Rose Shows for years. I understand that our society was most active during the '80s and '90s. We have come a long way and look forward to a bright future with our roses and friends. Unfortunately, as some other local rose societies have folded, ours has dwindled. Membership is just under 100 currently, but we always welcome new members.

I joined our group in 2013 because of my desire to grow nice roses for my wife, Sharon. Without the knowledge I have today, I struggled as many newcomers do. But fortunately, a friend, Kathy Zimbler, shared her knowledge and passion as a true rosarian and I joined her local rose society in Tampa. TRS enjoys trips to Mable Ringling's Garden in Sarasota, Ruth's Rose Garden at Florida Southern College in Lakeland, Harry Lieu Gardens in Orlando, gardens of Connie Vierbicky in Sarasota and recently Peggy Sherman's of TRS in Tampa. I learned a great deal from the gardens of Ralph & Jean Stream in Micanopy, FL. Open garden tours by members help showcase their techniques and tips. We plan to see many more locally as other members open their gardens! New friendships took place with lots of tips for growing my roses. The newsletters and ARS magazines along the way guided me. But who wrote all those articles and tips to benefit others? It was ARS, DSD and TRS members who enjoyed sharing their knowledge and time to help others! I asked many questions at our meetings with an open mind which led me to where I am today. We occasionally find the Tampa Bay Times publishing rose articles and mentioning TRS to help the readers. Some of our CRs provided talks and demonstrations at several Home Depot and Lowe's stores as well as local nurseries. Marilyn Bertch also promotes our rose show on local TV. Four years after joining TRS a member asked me to join the board of directors and also to drive the U-Haul to move supplies for our Rose Show. I eventually became engulfed with TRS. The inspiration of members moved me along the path of wanting to know more about roses. Several years ago, I tried to find past issues of "Tampa Talks Roses," our newsletter. I borrowed what I could find and scanned them into my computer, before returning them. I realized that TRS apparently did not have an historian and much of the history was not confined to one place. So, I started inputting whatever I could find and currently have at least 12 years' worth of newsletters to scan! I'll be searching for more when that is completed. I find this very worthwhile and informative to discover the past. Like you, I have lots of roses and other plants to tend to! And a new granddaughter in Sydney, Australia to visit in July! However, all this information will be accessible to our members in the future. I wonder if other rose societies have a club historian with some good records.

I especially like hearing senior members talk about the large rose shows held at WestShore Plaza in Tampa years ago. I understood that during those two-day shows, rosarians from the entire southeast U.S. exhibited here and that TRS had over 400 exhibitors! As I scan, I find writings telling of the comradery between everyone helping to host the shows: setting up, exhibiting, arranging roses for donations, awards, photos, then tear down and back to the regular meetings again. It certainly hasn't stopped since I became involved, with the exception of one Covid year. One main goal of ours is to increase membership. Last year TRS provided a horticultural exhibit at the Florida State Fair, held in Tampa. We manned our booth, provided educational materials and asked fairgoers to "Stop and Smell the Roses." Several of those persons joined at our next Rose Show and received a Knock Out Rose. This year we hosted again and were the featured horticultural exhibit at the fair. Expectations are high for us reaching out to the community and growing. The general meetings provide speakers, demonstrations, refreshments and raffle items. Herman Massey Park, the first downtown park in Tampa, reopened in 2008. The small park went through a massive renovation and a rose garden was proposed by TRS and created thanks to the vision of the late Fermin Rodriguez. Al Whitcomb, acting president of the society, organized the committee consisting of Clarence & Karen Prevatt, past president, Barbara Castelli and other dedicated TRS members. Forty rose bushes were donated by Hardin's Nursery and Dr. Malcolm Manners from Florida Southern College. TRS members prepped the area with proper irrigation

and amenities for the sandy Florida soil. The original monthly professional maintenance of the rose garden was replaced with annual pruning in February or early March. Roses were replaced when needed. Earth-Kind roses and 'Knock Out' roses thrive better without a regular spray and maintenance program and were added for easier maintenance. But sadly, the garden was replaced several years ago. Who knows what new public garden may be in our or the city's future! In the meantime, we look forward to providing some new roses at the Seminole Garden Center, our meeting place in Tampa. For more fun information, check our Facebook page! Our website is gearing up too!

Charlyne Woods recently shared with me that TRS was represented at many DSD and ARS conventions throughout the country. Charlyne, along with her late husband, Buddy and other friends, including Clarence & Karen Prevatt, Norma & George Bean, Ed & Monika Easom, Fermin & Laura Rodriguez, Gretchen Warren, Will & Gloria Evans, Eleanor Ramage, the Prue family and many others traveled as well. TRS has had many Silver and Bronze Medal winners throughout the years who have dedicated so much to helping others. You can find their names on many of our educational articles. The Fermin Rodriguez Award was initiated in 2010, currently for the best HT Rose from members of TRS. I was fortunate enough to win it once. We also had a Tampa Challenge Trophy in memory of Karl Envoldsen, initiated in 1983, but retired in 2010. The challenge has arisen in recent years as roses are being exhibited at meetings. TRS has also provided rose bushes to an Ag group at Middleton High School in Tampa to help beautify the campus.

While researching the history of TRS, I also hope to learn when we started our traditional December Holiday Celebration at the Columbia Restaurant in Ybor City! At this event, installation of new officers and board of directors is also done. Maybe Elvis will stop by again! As time marches on I hope to interview more senior members. Hopefully they have copies of early newsletters to scan and save for history. While reading their articles I feel like I've met them. Sorry time doesn't permit me to finish this history lesson now! There are so many past and current rosarians to recognize that this would take several more pages! Look for future TRS information to come as we grow in stature and with new rosarians!

## Tottering by Gently

“What’s in a name? That which we call a rose by any other name would smell as sweet.”

William Shakespeare

For over sixty years David C. H. Austin and David Austin Roses has been introducing delightful roses with the form and fragrance of the old garden roses, but with the repeat flowering habit of modern roses. Often, the names of his roses are as intriguing as the roses themselves.

David Austin’s love of the people, history, lore, and literature of his native land is wonderfully reflected in the names he chose for his rose introductions. Abraham Darby, ironmaster and inventor, was a founding figure in the Industrial Revolution. ‘Belle Story’ was named for one of first females to enlist in the Royal Navy’s Nursing Service. Characters from Chaucer (‘Wife of

Bath,’ ‘The Squire,’ ‘The Pilgrim,’ and many more) and Shakespeare (‘Prospero,’ ‘Othello,’ ‘Heavenly Rosalind,’ ‘Desdemona,’ etc.) appear prominently. ‘Scarborough Fair,’ a folk tune thought to have originated in the England of the Middle Ages remains popular (Simon & Garfunkel!). Authors Christopher Marlowe, Sir Walter Scott, Emily Brontë, and Roald Dahl, as well as fictional literary figures, Jude the Obscure (from a novel by Thomas Hardy), and Lady of Shallot (from a poem by Alfred Lord Tennyson) are celebrated. Composers Benjamin Britten and Sir Edward Elgar have an important place in the world of music as well as the rose garden. Darcy Bussell is a highly acclaimed English ballerina. Rosarians Gertrude Jekyll, Graham Thomas, and Constance Spry, all advocates and collectors of the old garden roses, receive their due. The Alnwick Castle,



Glamis Castle, Munstead Wood, Kew Gardens and the roses named after each bring to mind the bounty of gardens overflowing with color and fragrance.

As David Austin was considering which roses to eventually introduce in 2018, he decided to commemorate the 25th anniversary of a weekly cartoon first published in *Country Life* magazine in 1993. Created by cartoonist, artist, and sculptor Annie Tempest, the comic strip, *Tottering By Gently*, features the everyday life of Dicky

and Daffy Tottering and their family at Tottering Hall. The comic, based loosely on Annie's memories of growing up on her family's 3,000 acre Broughton Hall estate, is a humorous, tongue-in-cheek commentary on generational differences and on the differing perspectives of men and

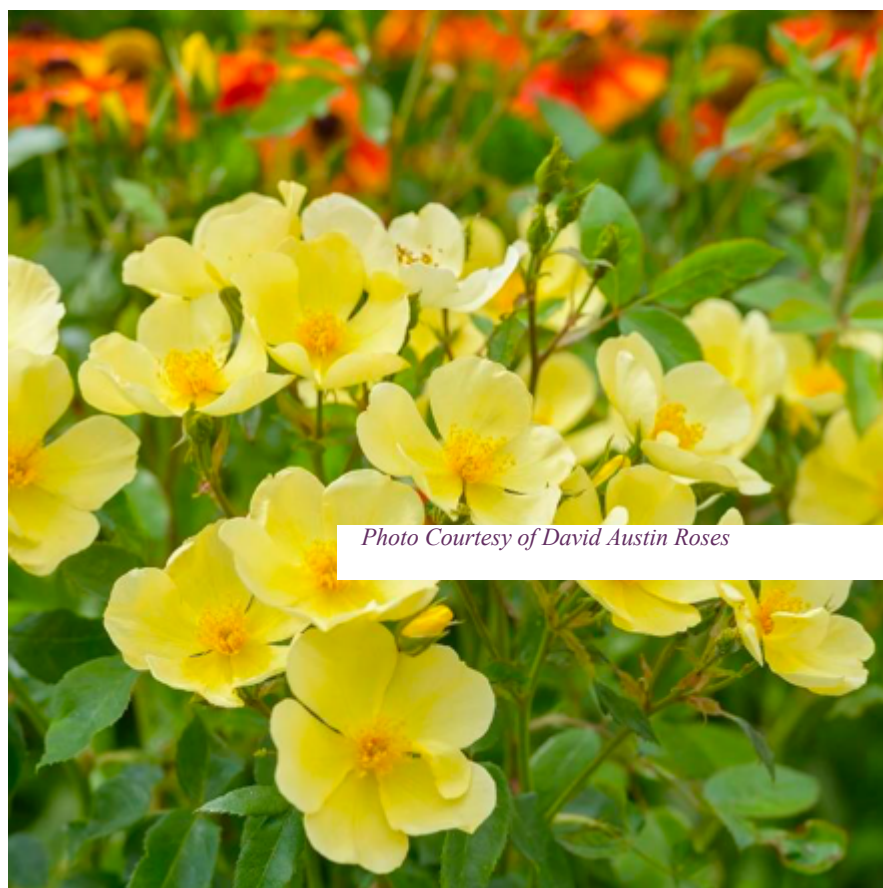


women on a variety of subjects, including sports, dieting, ageing, gardening, fashion, food, and social norms.

The rose, 'Tottering-By-Gently,' was introduced at the Royal Horticultural Society's Chelsea Flower Show in 2018 (along with 'Emily Brontë' and 'Mill On The Floss'). Its single yellow flowers are somewhat darker at the base of the petals and are accented by bright yellow stamens. As the plant matures expect to see fairly continuous bloom. The catalog suggests some may detect a light musk scent in its simple flowers, but apparently, I am fragrance-impaired. It makes a densely

foliated bush with dark green foliage that has done well without any spray in my Georgia garden. Although it is self-cleaning, tolerance to black spot in high pressure regions will likely be improved by regular dead-heading.

'Tottering-By-Gently' has grown larger than other yellow favorites 'Lemon Fizz,' 'Carefree Sunshine,' and 'Limoncello' in my garden and it produces a nice crop of orange-red hips if allowed. Plant this variety and you may discover gold in your garden!

## Consulting Rosarian Report

The first half of the year is the busy season for all of us in the rose world. Following the Midwinter Meeting, we go home to prune, feed, and otherwise care for our roses. We take photos of our fabulous spring blooms. We prepare for and work at our local rose shows. And some of us continue our education at the judges' school in May. Along the way, we are busy advising and assisting other, especially new, rose growers. We prepare our annual reports on various activities. And we notice which roses are blooming, and which were sulking. That's a busy spring!

Summer should be a relaxing time, right? Lie back in the sun while sipping some tea, maybe an occasional dip in the pool... But there's still summer work to be done in the garden. We need to keep up with watering, feeding, spraying, and dealing with annoying critters (grrr).

But wait, there's more!

You'll find Roses in Review in the next issue of "The American Rose." If you have added roses to your garden in the last three years, you may have one or more of the roses on the list. Whether you are a Consulting Rosarian or not, please share your experience with that rose. These reviews help everyone who grows roses to make better choices in buying and recommending roses to other rose growers. It's easy to report online and takes just a few minutes. If you are a CR, please respond whether you grow any of these roses or not; there's a box to check if you do not grow any of this year's roses. The Deep South District has been left in the dust for a number of years by those west coast folks in the tally of reporters and reports, yet we have lots of CRs. Let's try to show our commitment to roses this year by sharing our opinions for RIR.

Also, summer is the time when we collect nominations for Master Rosarians. We have a lot of Consulting Rosarians who meet the criteria for this designation, which was created to recognize those CRs who have made outstanding contributions as CRs over a significant period and are willing to continue in this role. This is not the same as Emeritus CR, for those who are ready to "retire" as CRs.

You may nominate any current Consulting Rosarian who has been a CR for at least 10 years, such a CR may nominate themselves (this is often the easiest way, since only the nominee is likely to have all the background information needed for the nomination form), or you may work with the nominee to collect necessary information. Nomination forms are available at <https://www.rose.org/member-forms>, or you may contact me. I'll need to receive all documentation by early August. We had no nominees last year despite having eligible candidates; please don't let another year pass without recognizing our hardest workers!

Finally, if you missed the winter Consulting Rosarian schools, you have another opportunity coming up. Tallahassee will be hosting a CR School on July 23. If you wish to become a Consulting Rosarian, need to recertify, or just want to learn more about roses, this is for you! 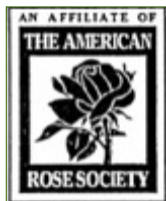
