Happy holidays, everyone! I've always thought it was so very thoughtful of Mother Nature to provide us with a break from rose care (sorry, Floridians!) so that we can attend to all the items on our to-do list this time of year like travelling, decorating, baking, entertaining, etc. Hopefully, your roses performed well for you this year and gave you as

much enjoyment as mine did. If not, this is the time to transplant or shovel prune and order new roses!

You will remember that during the Members' Meeting at the last MWM, the DSD Guidelines for District Meetings and Rose Shows revisions were unanimously approved by the Delegates from each society. However, there is still one more revision that involves changing the requirements for the DSD Challenge Class Katy Lampkin Trophy. Just like last year, It will need approval by a majority vote of a quorum of Delegates at the Members' Meeting on January 20th at the MWM. Our DSD Secretary, Sara Coleman (alsara.coleman@gmail.com), recently sent all Presidents a copy of the recommended change for your review and requested the name of your Delegate and Alternate be sent to her right away. Please make sure Sara has their names, that they are familiar with the change, and they will be ready to cast one vote per society. Also, let her know if no one is coming from your society.

We had a wonderful DSD Fall Conference & Rose Show October 13-14th hosted by a DSD Organizing Committee and held in Gainesville, Florida. About 73 people were registered which was a surprisingly low attendance since it has been closer to 100 in the past. I hope that everyone will help get the word out about all future DSD events and stop this downward trend towards a smaller group showing up to keep the events financially viable. A detailed account can be found later in this newsletter so I will just say that it was great seeing our old and new rose friends in person, participating in the rose show, hearing interesting speakers, and buying needed items from the vendors. Awards were presented at the banquet. I was thrilled to receive the ARS Silver Honor Medal. The Outstanding CR was Jim Small and Outstanding Hort. and Arrangements Judge was Sara Coleman, Congratulations!

The ARS Board of Directors had an online meeting October 25th. The following information was disseminated: 3,657 people attended 18 webinars this year. There will be an online CR School on the first two week-ends in February. A new website is almost ready for roll out. For 2024 there is a projected budget shortfall of \$73,000 mostly due to inflation and market pressure. Please be generous with your personal and local society ARS Annual Fund donations and pay your society's yearly \$70.00 ARS affiliate dues in January just to get it done for the year and so you won't forget later.

Speaking of dues, Kay Harrell, our DSD Treasurer, is now accepting the \$25 District dues (\$50 for those with over 100 members) for 2024. Thanks to her hard work and follow up, we again had 100% compliance on this for 2023! They are due no later than May but just send them to her in January and check that off your to-do list. Please do not make us nag you.

I'm looking forward to seeing you at the upcoming DSD Mid-Winter Meeting hosted by the Tampa Rose Society in Gainesville on January 19-21st. The invitation, registration form, and schedule of events were sent out to all editors and Presidents for wide distribution and are on the website. I hope you will give this your immediate attention and register now since the time is fast approaching. They have a wonderful week-end of educational programs, fun social events, a CR School, and rose vendors planned. After a 2-year hiatus due to COVID, we are once again requiring that all CRs and MRs submit a report about their activities to DSD CR Chair, Janet Newburgh, at jannewburgh@gmail.com. I sent out the form to all Presidents recently. It can be printed and snail mailed to Jan or handed to her at the MWM. However, we redesigned it so that you can fill in the blanks online, save it in your files, and just email it to her. This is by far the easiest way to do it. Whichever way you choose to do it, make sure you get it to her by February 1st. If you are planning to take the MWM CR School to become a CR, you must contact Janet ahead of time and get your application to her at least 30 days ahead of time. Do not wait til the last minute.

ARS will be holding a National Conference & Rose Show on September 9-13th, 2024 in Warwick, RI when our new ARS President, Officers, and Directors will be installed. Please plan on going!

Santa will be here soon, bringing us all the roses, gardening supplies, and books that we want (we hope)! I am at the point in life where 285 bushes are all I can care for in a quality manner so no new beds are being built. This means that if I want a new rose (and I always do!), another one has to go to make room. Curled up in front of the fire, I check my wish list against the brutally honest reviews in Horizon Roses and their availability in my catalogs to make sure I order exactly the right roses. If you want to order a copy of Horizon Roses let me know. When you're making your list be sure to read the reviews in "Roses in Review" and Horizon Roses then check with your Consulting Rosarians to make sure your choices will work for your climate and cultural practices. Ordering now for spring delivery ensures that you won't miss out on the ones you want or maybe they can be brought to the Mid-Winter Meeting by our vendors to save shipping!

Originally, I wasn't planning on attending the DSD Fall Convention and Rose Show because of other events, but I decided at the last minute to go. It was fun because I shared the trip and a room with fellow Rosarian

Bobbie Reed. And another pair, Rani Von Wurttemburg Ann Le Favre came as well. Ann is a new rose member, so we wanted to show her what fun these events are.

The first night we were on our own. We stopped by our favorite Italian Restaurant in Gainesville, Pomodor's. The food and the company were great. We took desert to go!

The next day, Friday was time to register, check out the vendors and attend the Arrangement Seminar. These are always interesting. Sandy Dixon had everyone .

The main vendor at the event was Rose Petals Nursery. They specialize in own root mostly old garden and other roses. They are located in Gainesville, not far from the convention site in the Best Western Gateway Grand. I had put together a list of roses I wanted from them (you can peruse their website at <u>https://www.rosepetalsnursery.com/</u>), but I left it at home. I asked Art Wayde, the owner of Rose Petals, if we could make a stop at his nursery on Sunday before we went home. More on that later!

Another vendor was Alexis D'Orsi. She was selling garden tools, gloves and other items. I picked up this fabulous weeding tool that I have fallen in love with. It has a sharp hook, so can get through heavy clay soil and weed roots. It's great for scraping soil away from corners and narrow spaces. I used it a lot cleaning out soil between flagstone I have, which I then replace with pebbles. I also bought a pair of nice rubber gloves which are great to use on wet soil and a pair of gauntlets. I have had a chance to use those yet because I haven't begun pruning my roses.

The next day we had seminars. The first was 'Old Garden Roses' presentation by Art Wade from Rose Petals Roses. It was very informative on different kinds of OGRs that you could add to your garden. I did wind up getting Brightside Cream, a climber that was featured in the presentation.



## **Consulting Rosarian Report** Taking Stock and Sharing

Happy Holidays to all! So far, we fortunately have not had shockingly cold weather like that which hit our gardens early last winter. Nevertheless, it pays to stay vigilant, to be alert to weather forecasts, and to keep

those frost cloths ready for when and if they are needed.

I am very pleased that many of you are already sending me your annual Consulting Rosarian Reports. I enjoy reading them and find them to be inspirational about your activities, new or old, that are being done on behalf of our roses, rose cultivation, and promoting our favorite flower to others. All active Consulting Rosarians (CRs) and Master Rosarians are to submit an annual report each year by February 1. Those reports should be either emailed to me (JanNewburgh@gmail.com) or mailed to me via the US Postal Service (Janet Newburgh, PO Box 237, Woodville FL 32362).

Sometime after the February 1 deadline, I plan to summarize key activities listed in those annual reports and to share that summary in one of these columns in 2024. I will not put anyone on the spot by listing names or specific local rose societies. Rather, I intend to focus on the main things that you have done this year, what you have learned about roses, including specific varieties that have given you the most (or the least) success, and what outreach activities you have been involved in, whether fruitful or not.

I also ask you to log on to the American Rose Society (ARS) website and check your CR audit year. Do you need to take courses, including Chemical Safety, in 2024 in order to maintain your CR status? At least four Continuing Education (CE) classes, including one on Chemical Safety, must be taken at least every four years in order to meet the CE requirement. If you believe that you have taken classes that would update your CR audit year beyond what is indicated on the ARS website, please let me know what courses you have taken and when and where, and I'll do what I can to make sure credit is given where it's due.

While checking your information on the ARS website, if you have been a CR for at least 10 years of consecutive service but are not yet a Master Rosarian, you may want to consider this move. The requirements and application form for the Master Rosarian Designation can be found on the Deep South District Rose Society website. In addition to 10 continuous years of service as a CR, the basic requirements for becoming Master Rosarian include: outstanding performance, as documented on the nomination form; being an active, accredited CR at the time of your nomination; and a willingness to continue to serve as a CR. It is assumed that you will maintain your membership in the American Rose Society, as is the case for all CRs.

For those who are not yet a CR, I hope that you will consider becoming one. The basic requirements for becoming a CR are: having grown a variety of roses for at least 5 years; being a member of the American Rose Society for at least the last two years; attending a CR school; and passing a written, open-book exam. More information on becoming a CR, including the application form, also can be found on the Deep South District Rose Society website.

At least two CR schools are scheduled in the near future. One will be held on Sunday morning in Gainesville as part of the Deep South District Mid-Winter Meeting on January 19-21, 2024. These schools also can be used by existing CRs to update their own credentials.

I wish you a wonderful year ahead, full of beautiful roses and good cheer, and I hope to see you at the CR school on January 21


