Please be sure to vote and make your voice heard on these important Bylaws changes.
- 3. Check out the new clearinghouse for asking and answering rose questions sponsored by ARS. It's called The Rose Forum and is found at www.forum.rose.org. You are encouraged to visit it and register.
- 4. The Beverly Hills Rose Society is once again spearheading a membership and fund raising campaign for ARS like they did 2 years ago when the fabulous Rose Atlas book was given away with an ARS donation at a certain level. Now they have a new book and a new incentive! For a \$100 donation or more you will receive the Rose Atlas: Creators of Roses, Pioneers & Dynasties. Checks are sent to the Beverly Hills Rose Society. Please support this effort and see the information below.

**Special ARS Membership Drive:** First grass-roots incentive program represents a unique donor/giving opportunity exclusive to those non-ARS members of affiliated local rose societies to join ARS for the very first time (domestic within the USA only). This option involves the giving of a donation of \$75.00 to Beverly Hills Rose Society. In return BHRS will register those individuals to become ARS Members with all benefits. Throughout the USA there are several hundred affiliated local rose societies. If each society were to recognize just TWO of their deserving prominent non-ARS volunteer members with an ARS membership, our membership ranks would swell by over 400 members gaining new income source of \$30,000.00. BHRS is responsible for registering new ARS Members and forwarding funds to ARS.

Supporting the ARS Educational Endowment Trust (EET): The second grass-roots incentive program is geared to improving the health and welfare of the ARS. - 6. The new Bronze and Silver Honor Medals are now in stock at ARS. Thanks to my husband's research, ARS is now able to purchase these from a new company at a much more affordable price and the savings are being passed along to the local societies! The new cost of the Bronze Medal is now \$50 each and cost of the Silver is \$100 each for a 50% savings!

The results of the 2023 ARS Newsletter Competition have just been published. Please join me in congratulating Stephen Hoy for receiving an Award of Merit for excellence in rose writing.

Another fun DSD event is coming up on October 11-13 when the DSD Fall Conference and Rose Show will be held in Gainesville, Florida. See the description of the week-end and registration form included with this newsletter. Thank you to Gainesville and Marion County Rose Societies for hosting this!

The Board voted to move the Mid-Winter Meeting (MWM) to March so that the Fall Conference and MWM would not be so close together. Therefore, the dates for the 2025 MWM to be held in Gainesville will be February 28-March 2. Please make all your members aware of this change so they can plan properly. Tropical RS will be our hosts.

The last DSD event that we have a host for is the 2025 Mid-Winter Meeting so please talk to your society about hosting a Mid-Winter Meeting or a Fall Conference & Rose Show. There is a manual to help you with this and *your society keeps 75% of the profit!* If you can help, let me or Karen Prevatt know.

Enjoy your early summer gardens. Stay safe and well hydrated in this heat. I look forward to being with you in October at our DSD Convention!




## In Memoria Walter B. Reed

#### Walter B. Reed, August 24, 1939 - January 16, 2024

With much sadness we report that Walt Reed, a pillar of SMRS for 24 years, succumbed to cancer on January 16th surrounded by Linda and other family members. When writing about his rose accomplishments, it's hard to think of anyone else who has contributed more to our society than Walt did, in partnership with Linda. He and Linda joined us in 2000 after being successful rose growers, exhibitors, and Consulting Rosarians in Ohio.

After moving here, he immediately set to work planning and installing a beautiful rose garden at their home in Peachtree City. This garden of a couple hundred, exquisite roses was on numerous tours to include the ARS 2010 National Conference. He served as SMRS President, received the ARS Bronze Honor Medal twice (from his Ohio society and ours), became a Master Rosarian, ARS Horticulture Judge and International Judge. At our rose shows he could be found setting up and tearing down, being Chair of Clerks, doing Classification, or manning the Information Table. He wrote the monthly garden care column for our newsletter for many years, managed the rose garden we cared for at Heritage Bank, and presented programs at our meetings as well as at the District level.

I'm probably missing several things but some of my most treasured memories are of riding with him and Linda to judges' school and then to judge rose shows or attend District or National Confer-ences. When David was away and I had a problem with my rose sprayer I could call Walt and he'd come right over to bail me out. He was a mentor and could answer the many questions I



## **Rose Agony and Ecstacy**

Many of us love to exhibit our roses. It's not just about winning prizes and bragging rights. It's about showcasing our roses to the public and encouraging others to take up our hobby and in so doing beautify their own environment. It also might also increase the membership of our home societies and the ARS. That's always a good thing.

In order to accomplish all of this you need to prepare in advance. We all have a favorite show we like to exhibit in whether it our home society or some other show. For me, it's the Thomasville, Georgia show every Spring.

The reason I like the Thomasville show so much is what the city and community contribute to putting on a great show. If you've never been, the show is in a very large tent If you're exhibiting, don't let this concern you as it's airconditioned throughout so even if it's hot outside, it's nice and cool inside. There's always lots of goodies in the prep area to snack on as all the good cooks contribute.

What really sets it apart from all the others is what happens just prior to the show opening to the public. There is a parade and marching band complete with majorettes. The Rose Queen and her court is introduced to the awaiting crowd, which is several hundred people by this time. The Mayor welcomes everyone and the show chair introduces the winner of the hybrid tea queen. Last year it was Mr Caleb, which was the second year in a row for that magnificent red rose. The door to

the tent opens and the crowd files in. In all honesty, the Thomasville show is better than many of the National shows I've been fortunate enough to attend. Rose ecstasy for sure!



Rose ecstasy sometimes goes hand in hand with agony. In my quest to present the best roses possible, I closely monitored everything that goes with optimal growth. Being in the Deep South District, what we have plenty of is black spot and bugs. So, In order to prevent any of these issues, I started an aggressive spray program. By the time the show arrived, I had some really nice roses, bug and fungus free. Show results echoed my thoughts.

In the days and weeks following the show, I noticed my plants looking stressed. Upon close examination, I had a huge infestation of spider mites. A miticide was applied but it seemed to do no good. What the heck was going on? Then it occurred to me the lessons that I should have remembered from my training to be a consulting rosarian.

Over application of pesticides

can result in pests that can become resistant to the chemical controls. In my quest to have perfect roses had resulted in having super mites. A pest free desert had resulted in a pest paradise. The only recourse was the time-honored water wanding to blast them off. It's taken them awhile to recover but lesson learned.

The morale of the story is no matter how much you want to succeed, follow the rules and remember what you've learned.



## **New Deer Product**

Hello Rose Friends!

A while back, I wrote about some of the issues I had with deer in my yard, not just for roses, but many plants were being destroyed. I have moved a lot of roses to my fenced in backyard which they don't get to. And I planned some exciting new deer proof plants for my front. However, roses aren't the only things deer will eat.

This year, I'm using a new product that I want to recommend to you. The name is Hinder, and it's a spray. Jim Young at Purely Organic recommended it when he delivered our order, so I gladly bought it. Its active ingredient is Ammonium Soaps of Higher Fatty Acids 13.8%. The concentrate does have a strong ammonia smell, but when mixed it is not detectable. I bought a one gallon sprayer (on Amazon, only \$11.99) and mix about six ounces per gallon. That is usually enough to spray all the vulnerable items in my front yard. Its only drawback is that it must be applied each time it rains. Earlier in the year, that was an issue. But it's been very dry lately and I haven't had to

I actually got to see my daylily blooms this year! Last year I don't think I saw more than two or three. The remaining roses are not getting munched, nor are the clematis and other items.

So give Jim a call when you put in your orders and make sure you ask for Hinder!

## Consulting Rosarian Report Taking Stock and Sharing

Consulting Rosarians, Master Rosarians, Outstanding Consulting Rosarians, Emeritus Consulting Rosarians—are you one of these? The Deep South District has over one hundred active Consulting Rosarians, and about a third of these have earned the title of Master Rosarian. These are the

people who play a big role in making our rose societies go, and in promoting roses in our communities. What does it take to reach one of these levels? Applications for each of them can be found on the American Rose Society website, under "Resources" and then under "Member Forms."

Consulting Rosarians (CRs) represent the American Rose Society's largest active outreach entity. We do so much to help others with their roses! If you are not already a CR, I encourage you to look into the CR requirements and, if you meet them, to consider becoming a CR. The basic requirements are to be at least 18 years old, to have been a member of the American Rose Society for at least 2 years, active in a local society, to have grown roses for at least 5 years, to attend a Consulting Rosarian School and then to earn a score of at least 70 points on an open book exam. Consulting Rosarian Schools are offered regularly within the Deep South District and elsewhere in the US, and the American Rose Society has been offering an online CR school each February. CRs need to be willing to provide advice to others in rose-growing activities, to write articles and give presentations when asked, to participate in the annual "Roses in Review" program, and to submit a report of their CR-related activities each year to the District CR Coordinator. At least every four years, CRs need to update their status by attending a CR school or at least four relevant continuing education classes, including one on Chemical Safety, but CRs who maintain their active status as a CR do not need to re-take the exam.

Currently active CRs who would like to become a Master Rosarian (MR) must have served as a CR for at least 10 years, have an outstanding record of service that is documented in the application form, and be willing to continue to serve as a CR. Several CRs in our Deep South District appear to have met the MR requirements but who have not yet applied for that title. I encourage them to send me an application to become a MR. These applications are reviewed by a committee consisting of the District CR Coordinator, the District Director, and one other person. Each year, each district can issue one Outstanding Consulting Rosarian (OCR) Award. This is the highest award that the District can give to a CR for their work, and it also can be given by the American Rose Society. Candidates for the OCR Award also must have been active CRs for at least 10 years, have participated in Local and District Society activities, have demonstrated competency in all the main areas of local rose culture, must have made a presentation in a CR school or rose culture workshop, must demonstrate a willingness to share their knowledge with other interested individuals, and must wholeheartedly support the mission of the American Rose Society. The Outstanding Consulting Rosarian Award is a lifetime award that can be received

only once. A committee consisting of the District Director, the District CR Chair, and the District Chair of Prizes and Awards selects the recipient of this award, which is presented at the Annual District Convention.

And finally, there is the CR Emeritus award. This award honors those who have served as a CR for at least 10 years and who no longer wish to be active CRs. Qualified CRs who are interested in this award can obtain the application form from the American Rose Society website (as noted above, under "Resources and then "Member Forms") and submit the form to the District CR Chair (that would be me!). CR Emeritus individuals receive a certificate acknowledging their service that is presented at a District meeting, and they no longer have to meet the requirements that apply to active CRs.

I hope that you will consider these awards as appropriate recognition for all that you and your colleagues do in promoting America's Favorite Flower. Do let me know if I can assist you in any way in applying for these awards. And thank for your all that you do.

PS: Please remember to log on to the American Rose Society website (Rose.org) and check to see if the records for you are up to date, including your status as an ARS member and the date that your next CR audit is due. If you see any problem, please let me know and I'll do what I can to help resolve it.

According to the DSD By-Laws, each local society's Annual Dues are due by the **end of May**. These annual dues or if you prefer, *contribution*, are used to pay the nominal but ongoing expenses of the DSD. (Local societies with 100 or more members are asked

to pay \$50/year and those with less than 100 members are asked for only \$25/year.)

Birmingham RS, Central Florida Heritage RS, Gainesville RS, Grtr. Palm Beach RS, Jacksonville RS, Marion County, RS, Pensacola RS, Ramer RS, South Metro RS, Tallahassee RS, Tampa RS, Thomasville RS, and Tropical RS have all sent in their annual DSD dues for 2024!

If your rose society is NOT listed above, PLEASE ask your society treasurer to send in its dues right away! There are 19 local societies in the DSD and to date,

the above 13 have sent in their dues. That means that 6 local societies have not yet sent in their 2024 Dues! Let's shoot for 100%!
