How to grow good roses in Atlanta

Pick a good rose

Pick a variety from the list if possible or use the American Rose Society <u>Handbook for Selecting Roses</u>. Buy disease-free bushes with at least three fat canes. Avoid bushes packed in plastic bags, especially those with heavily waxed canes.

Location

Find a good location with full sun 6-8 hours per day, no root competition from neighboring trees and bushes, good air flow, and good drainage.

Test your soil

Test your soil by taking a sample to the UGA Extension Office in your county (extension.uga.edu/county-offices). Based on your results, add amendments to bring your soil to a pH of 6.5. Use pelletized dolomitic lime to raise pH level or sulfur to lower it.

Planting

Dig a hole two feet wide and 1½ feet deep. Mix the soil with an equal amount of cow manure and soil conditioner or compost, plus additional organics as desired, but NO fertilizer. Discard rocks, sticks, and trash, then mix. Refill hole with half of amended soil, then remove rose from pot and position it in hole. Use the rest of soil to refill hole and mound above soil level until soil is even with the bud union (graft). Tamp down and water well. Water daily for first 10 days.

Care

Water deeply on a regular basis. Use two to three gallons of water once weekly during cool weather, three times a week in hot weather.

Feed your roses regularly during the blooming season, March through September. Organics are rose favorites, like compost, manure, alfalfa, or commercial combinations like Mills Magic Rose Mix, Purely Organic, Rose Tone, or Milorganite. Use a chemical fertilizer like 10-10-10 monthly; a liquid fertilizer like fish emulsion or Miracle Gro every two weeks, and/or a slow-release fertilizer like Osmocote 4-, 6-, or 9-month.

Protect your rose against fungal diseases like blackspot. While there are some organic options, chemical fungicides are more effective. Use a soil drench, granules, or spray like BioAdvanced Rose and Flower Care, Bonide Infuse Systemic Disease Control, Fertilome Liquid Systemic Fungicide II, or Ortho Rose-Pride Disease Control.

Do not spray regularly for insects. Insecticides will kill all bugs, both good and bad, and our roses need all the help they can get from beneficial bugs.

Prune your roses each year in late February or early March. Cut dead branches, diseased canes, canes that cross and rub against each other, spindly growth, and growth pointing toward the center of the bush. Reduce the size of the bush by one-half to two-thirds. Prune once-blooming roses after they bloom, in late May.

Deadhead by cutting off spent blooms after petals fade. Cut at an angle just above a leaf with five leaflets. This will stimulate new growth and more blooms. Continue deadheading through early October.

Mulch to subdue weeds, retain soil moisture, and insulate the roots from summer heat and winter cold. Organic mulches like wood chips, pine straw, bark nuggets, and ground leaves also decay and feed the soil. Keep a three inch layer of mulch under and around your bush all year long.
